

MILITARY FUNERAL HELD AT SUNBURG

**Elmer Lansverk of Near Sunburg
Laid to Rest Sunday,
Aug 28**

The Kerkhoven Banner contains the following item concerning the burial of Elmer Lansverk, deceased soldier:

Sunday at two o'clock a large congregation of people gathered at the Lansverk home, near Sunburg, in due respect to the remains of Elmer Lansverk, who gave his life in the World War.

The American Legion Post, from Kerkhoven, was in charge of the funeral and a good turnout of ex-service men was in attendance. The regular military funeral was carried out in first-class manner. The firing squad was present and taps sounded as the remains were lowered to their last resting place.

Elmer Lansverk was a young man who resided on a farm near Sunburg before his enlistment in the army. After his enlistment and a short period of training at a camp in this country, he was sent abroad and landed in England, where he took sick and passed away.

The community joins in extending sympathy to the bereaved family, who can look up and be proud of their son and brother, who gave all that he had to his country.


