

WILLMAR WON EASILY SUNDAY

Willmar Trimmed Litchfield Sunday By Score of 17 to 3 in Last Game

Willmar defeated Litchfield at the local ball park last Sunday afternoon by a score of 17 to 3 in the last game of the season. R. Johnson was on the mound for the winners and allowed 9 hits to 13 for three of the Litchfield pitchers. Willmar scored 13 runs in the first three innings of the game.

FIRST INNING

Litchfield—Hannon out, R. Johnson to Christian. V. Miller fanned. No runs, no hits, no errors.

Willmar—Severinson popped out to short. Binga and Holmberg were both handed passes. Kletly was safe on third's error, bases full. Christian called out on three strikes. Berry smashed the ball to right for a single, Binga and Holmberg scoring, and Berry went second on the throw to the plate. Carlson walked, Nordstrom was safe on short's error, Kletly scoring and Berry also scored when short threw to first. Johnson fanned. Four runs, 1 hit, 2 errors.

SECOND INNING

FACTS ABOUT OUR 2432 COUNTY FARMS

Thirty Per Cent of Our County Farms Are Operated By Tenants

The following are a number of very interesting facts concerning the agricultural conditions in Kandiyohi County as gleaned from the Agricultural Bulletin issued by the Department of Commerce. This bulletin embraces statistics taken from the fourteenth census of 1920.

Within Kandiyohi County there are: 2,432 farms against 2,237 in 1910 and 2,265 in 1900.

Eighty-eight of these farms are operated by women.

There are 28 farms from 3 to 9 acres; 32 farms from 10 to 19 acres; 102 farms from 20 to 49 acres; and 254 farms from 50 to 99 acres; 826 farms from 100 to 174 acres; 719 farms from 175 to 299 acres; 442 farms from 300 to 499 acres; 35 farms from 500 to 999 acres and but two farms from 1000 acres and over.

The land area of the county is 512,640 acres of which 464,941 is in farms. In 1910 exactly 1000 acres less was used in farms. Since 1900 twenty thousand acres have been made into farms.

In 1920 there were 360,306 acres of improved land in farms. In 1910 we find that there were 9,603 acres more of improved land in farms.

Wood land in farms totals 23,707 acres.

Ninety per cent of the acreage of Kandiyohi County is used in farms. The average acreage per farm in the county is 191 acres.

Farm Property Value
All farm property is valued at \$60,816,751. In 1910 the value was placed at forty million dollars less and in 1900 at fifty millions of dollars less.

Farm land in 1920 is valued at 44 million, farm buildings at eight million, implements and machinery at 3 million and live stock at five million. The increases in value since 1910, respectively for the farms, building, machinery and live stock are: 19 million, 5 million, 2 million and three millions of dollars.

Average Values
The average value of all farm property including farm land, buildings machinery and livestock is \$25,000 per farm. Land alone per acre on the average is valued at 96 dollars. Land and buildings on the farms average in value per farm \$21,000.

Of the 2,432 farms in the county but 1,668 farms are operated by their owners. This is 68 per cent. Since 1910 only 17 farms have been added to the list of those operating their farms. In 1920 there were 1,813 farms operated by their owners which shows that since that time 145 farms of the 1,813 are not now being run by the owners. In short the number of farms operated by the owners has decreased from 1813 to 1668.

In 1920 twenty-one farms were operated by managers and in 1910 15 farms were thus operated. The number of acres in such farms totalled 5,954.

In 1920 there were 743 farms operated by tenants. Since 1910 there has been an increase of tenants of 172 and since 1900 of 304 farms. This means that 30 per cent of all our farms are operated by tenants. Such farms total in acreage 182,405. The value of

such lands and buildings is \$17,536,144. Here are the different forms of tenancy in 1920: Share tenants, 378; Share cash tenants, 176; and cash tenants, 289.

"DON'TS" OFFERED FOR FIRE SAFETY

State Fire Marshal Sounds Note of Warning Against Bad Practices

Magnus Olson, the wide-awake farm fire insurance secretary requests The Tribune to publish the following note of warning:

According to reports filed with the State Fire Marshal, farm property in Minnesota valued at \$2,978,408 was destroyed by fire during 1918. \$1,734,815 of this loss is charged to the forest fire which swept northern Minnesota, October 12th, 1918. Probably 75% of this loss may be charged to carelessness or negligence.

Your property may be in this list this year or next. Will you do all you can to prevent it?

Don't allow anyone to smoke in your barn or other outbuildings. Don't keep your automobile or tractor in the barn but provide a separate garage, which should not expose another building.

Don't keep gasoline except in closed safety containers. Never store quantities of ten gallons or more except in underground tanks or at least 150 feet from any building.

Don't hang up old clothes or oily rags in barn or other outbuildings except in metal lined lockers.

Don't allow steam engines without spark arresters near barn or other buildings.

Don't fail to provide lightning rods for every important building. Don't burn trash, brush or rubbish near buildings, fences or other property, and nowhere except with greatest care.

Don't put hay in mow until properly cured. Be careful also with damp fodder and straw, and bins of moist grain and seeds. Don't put new hay or fodder on old hay, straw or fodder. Danger of spontaneous combustion. Clean floors thoroughly before storing hay.

Don't neglect to have ladder, buckets, and water handy at all times and to keep each in its proper place.

Don't smoke meat except in buildings removed a safe distance from other buildings unless properly equipped to prevent fires.

Don't neglect to have all flues cleaned, examined and repaired at least once a year.

Don't pass stove pipes through ceilings, roofs or wooden partitions. Don't fail to place metal protection under all stoves and protect woodwork where stoves or furnaces are close to walls.

Don't allow children to play with matches. Keep matches in closed, metal box.

Don't use kerosene to start a fire. Many lives are lost annually from this cause.
