## BENJAMIN SWALIN HIGHLY AWARDED

### Young Violinist Awarded Highest Scholarship by Jenny Lind Foundation

To Benjamin Swalin, Minneapolis violinist, has been awarded the first scholarship within the gift of the Jenny Lind Memorial foundation. Mr. Swalin is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Benjamin N. Swalin, 2115 Fifth Ave. N. Born and raised in this city, he never took a lesson outside of Minneapolis until this spring, when he went to New York to apply for admission to the violin classes of Fritz Kreisler. He was accepted and followed the master to Blue Hill, Me., where at the latter's suggestion he received instruction throughout the summer and fall.  
Mr. Kreisler, after whom the famous and recently disbanded string quartet was named and for a number of years first concertmaster of the Boston Symphony orchestra, never writes any letters of recommendation for his pupils, but in his personal instruction throughout the summer and fall, he spoke of Mr. Swalin as the scholar who had made the finest marks of advancement of them all.  
For two years Mr. Swalin has been a member of the Minneapolis Symphony orchestra, and he had an opportunity to compare his playing with that of other violinists of the city. But feeling that after the severe and often almost discouraging amount of work with Mr. Kreisler that he should stay on in order to reap the benefit of his endeavor, he declined the offer, although at the time he did not see his way financially to back up this resolution. Word of Mr. Swalin's energetic work reached members of the board of the Jenny Lind foundation, and upon a hearty letter of recommendation from Mr. Oberholfer it was decided that the money available for scholarship should be given to the young violinist. The by-laws of the foundation dictate that candidates for scholarship must be Minnesota born musicians.  
The aim of the foundation is to create an annual scholarship of at least \$500, but it is not yet in the possession of funds large enough to realize this aim. It was decided at a board meeting that the scholarship available for 1922 and 1923 shall be awarded to some winner in the annual scholars' contests arranged by the Thursday Musical and the Schubert club of St. Paul.

Benjamin Swalin has taken violin instruction from boyhood. He has studied under several teachers, but principally under Otto Meyer. When a member of the Symphony orchestra he was, in spite of being the youngest in the organization allowed to make the midwinter and spring tours of that organization. When at home he gave violin instruction himself, and before his departure for New York appeared several times in public. —Minneapolis Journal, Nov. 6.

The promising young violinist was born in Minneapolis 26 years ago. His father came with the Swain family to Kandiyohi county originally. He worked at Willmar as a blacksmith during the early days in the shops of Bengtson and A. J. Ekander, and moved to Minneapolis in 1888. The career of his promising son will be watched with pride by his uncles and other relatives and friends in this community.
