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RENVILLE COUNTY AUDITOR TO FACE THREE CHARGES

The case of the State of Minnesota against County Auditor A. O. Schmidt charged with perjury, is on trial. The case was called yesterday morning with Col. Pratt, assistant attorney general of St. Paul appearing for the state, and M. C. O'Donnell of Minneapolis, John A. Dalzell of Morton and D. F. Nordstrom of Olivia appearing for the defendant. The forenoon yesterday was spent in the selection of a jury and the case is on as we go to press. The charge on which the county auditor is being tried is in connection with the making of false statements in an application for automobile license, it being alleged that the automobile had been stolen by some one previous to the making of this application. Three other indictments rest against the county auditor for having stolen property in his possession and for the alleged transportation of intoxicating liquor.—Olivia Times, Dec. 1.

Sheriff Sunde, who is a representative of a faction bitterly opposed politically to the auditor, has made his complaints. The case was heard before Justice H. A. Lohnitz at Bird Island several months ago and was dismissed because of lack of evidence to sustain the charge. The cases are causing intense interest in all parts of Renville county. Judge Qvale is presiding.
