LOSES LIFEMATE**

**Mrs. S. S. Glarum Passes On After
Over Fifty Years of Wedded
Life**

Mrs. Ella P. Glarum, beloved wife of Sivert S. Glarum, pioneer business-man of Willmar, passed at the Litchfield avenue home yesterday morning soon after ten o'clock, death coming as a welcome relief after an illness of several months. Mrs. Glarum was physically disabled by a fall many years ago, yet continued by sheer grit to be active in keeping up her home and administering to the comfort of her husband and others, until she became entirely disabled some time ago thru another accident, since which time she has been bedridden. The bereaved husband has the sympathy of a large circle of friends in his dark hour of sorrow and loneliness. The funeral will take place next Saturday afternoon, Dec. 17, at two o'clock from the residence and with services at 2:30 at the Lutheran Free church. Ella Peterson Karwand Glarum was born at Stangvik, Nordmör, Norway, Aug. 30, 1843. She came to Northport, Michigan, in 1869, and on March 2 in the following year she was married to Mr. Glarum at above mentioned place. They continued to live in Michigan until in the fall of 1877 when they came to Willmar. In the next spring Mr. Glarum opened the grocery business, which he still continues. Two children were born to them both of whom died in infancy. Mrs. Glarum was the third in a family of ten children. Two sisters survive her—one residing in Oregon and one in Norway. A brother, Gudrun P. Karwand, whom she cared for in his illness, passed away last year. There are seventeen nephews and nieces. The deceased was a woman who always was concerned about the well-being of others, and never spared herself. Peace to her memory!

Mr. Selke is a very capable speaker and entered into his subject in an interesting manner which was pleasing to the audience.

The meeting then adjourned after singing the national hymn, "America." When the meeting was over, many of the school officers were heard expressing themselves greatly pleased with the program and that they had gotten a great deal of benefit from attending the meeting.
