#### **FATAL RIDE ON SLIPPERY PAVING**

August A. Johnson Loses Life In **Auto Accident Near** Kandivihi

August A. Johnson was instantaneously killed Friday night under his Buick car when it skidded off the pavement near Kandiyohi and went down over an embankment. His family escaped serious injuries.

August A. Johnson, who lived on the old Lawler place west of Kandiyohi, was returning home from a Christmas program held at the Whittier school shortly after eleven o'clock. It was a bitterly cold night, the coldest of the season so far. When he approached a place where several cars had skidded off the pavement recently, Mr. Johnson remarked to his wife that he must be careful and drive slowly or they would go down the bank.
