

STATE'S CROP SHOW WINNERS ANNOUNCED

Martin County Man Takes Championship Corn Sweepstakes Itasca Wins on Potatoes.

Minneapolis, Jan. 4.—Almost every sort of farm product raised in the state, from tobacco to a "vest pocket" squash, was on exhibition in the Minnesota Crop Show in Minneapolis last week.

The combined efforts of the State Horticultural society, the Crop Improvement association, and the Potato Growers association made the show the largest and best winter crop exposition ever held here, according to R. S. Mackintosh, general secretary.
