

PASSING OF JOHN LUNDIN Grant Co. (S. D.) Tribune: The many friends of the John Lundin family, residing in Madison township, were shocked and grieved to learn of the passing of Mr. Lundin at his home on Sunday afternoon, December 25. Mr. Lundin had been ailing for some time past, being a sufferer from stomach troubles, and was taken seriously ill about a month ago. Prior to that time he had been very active about the home place and no one suspected that his condition was at all serious. Sunday afternoon about one o'clock the immediate members of his family were called to his bedside by a summons each dreaded. He passed away a few minutes later.

John Lundin was born in Sweden August 25, 1860, and came to America in 1882. After remaining in this country a few years he returned to his native land and then came back to America, buying a farm in Kandiyohi County, Minn. In 1903 he was united in marriage to Miss Alice Nelson (Sakarlasen) and to this union six children were born, two preceding him in death.

Mr. Lundin moved to this county in 1909, having purchased the Johnson farm in Madison township, and by hard work and native thrift developed it into one of the most modern farms in the county. Blessed with kindness rare in these days, and ever actuated by a spirit of neighborliness and tolerance, Mr. Lundin endeared himself to all those with whom he came in contact. His passing is truly mourned. He leaves to mourn his loss his widow and four children, namely: Paul, Myrtle, Walter and Lawrence, all of whom made their home with their parents.

The funeral was held Dec. 30, at the Swedish Mission church at La Bolt, Rev. A. W. Magnuson officiating. The pall bearers were Messrs. John H. Berg, J. B. Lindell, Ole A. Peterson, A. G.
