A NEW POLITICAL PARTY
Editor Tribune—Although I have been in the reform work fully fifty years, I have never been enthusiastic for a new or third party.

But issues of sufficient importance create new parties if the existing political organizations cannot handle them. Thus the slavery question called the Republican party into being because neither the Whigs nor the Democrats could line up on either side as parties.

The great Daniel Webster truly said "No Republic can long endure where the tendency is for wealth to accumulate in the hands of the few."

All history verifies this statement. Therefore it would seem to me to be the patriotic duty of every citizen to study the situation. Congress could arrest the tendency of wealth to get into a few hands if it so desired for it has unlimited power through both an inheritance and an income tax up to actual confiscation.

But there is scarce a congressional district in this country where the special interests do not nominate and generally elect their candidates.

We had a tax on excess profits, the most just tax that could possibly be conceived, but the profiteers had it removed and now they cannot pay the soldiers' bonus.

The great danger in an attempt to form a new party is from impractical radicals who would overload the movements. One big issue is enough at a time.

Where I to write the platform of a new party designed to be successful I would have but four or five planks in the platform, as follows:

- 1. We view with alarm the rapid increase of the wealth of this nation in the hands of the few and pledge our party if entrusted with power to enact legislation and strictly enforce laws that will arrest this tendency.
2. We stand for government ownership and operation of railroads, telegraph lines and all other public utilities.
3. We favor a bonus for the soldier boys to be paid from an excess profits tax.
4. We are unreservedly in favor of universal world disarmament.
5. We are opposed to government by injunction, especially on labor disputes and will carefully restrict by law the power of courts in issuing injunctions.
6. We are in favor of rigid economy in public expenditures in both State and nation.

This would be the limit. If a political party could be called into existence that would stand squarely on this platform it would command my support and in due time sweep the country. These six planks would strike at an existing evil and would be more popular and effective than sixty covering every subject under the sun.
