64 MEN MUSTERED IN ON THURSDAY

Local N. G. Unit Mustered in By Capt. Gustav Anderson of Bismarck, N. D.

The local company of the National Guard was mustered in on Thursday evening, March 23, by a regular army officer, Captain Gustav Anderson of Bismarck, N. D. The state muster and federal inspection was held in the Auditorium at the fair grounds when 64 men were mustered in and passed the federal inspection. Captain Anderson was assisted by Major Carter of the 5th Infantry of St. Cloud and by Capt. Kircher of Mankato. The three officers of this city who participated in the muster were Henry Young, Archie Carlson and Russell Curran.
After the muster had taken place, Captain Anderson complimented the men on the enthusiasm that they have taken in regard to getting the National Guards in this city. He also said that this was one of the finest bunch of young men that he had struck at any place in the state as he makes his tours.

A large delegation of residents of Genesee and Kandiyohi townships in particular those residing near state aid roads Nos. 4, 6 and 8 appeared before the County Commissioners Friday at the courthouse to confer regarding the work planned to be done on No. 6 which runs on the border line between Genesee and Kandiyohi townships. Bids on contract work on this road had been received on Friday. Citizens from Genesee presented a discussion for work on road No. 4 further East from No. 6 and closer to Atwater. Others mentioned No. 8 and still others agreed that No. 6 as established and work decided upon was satisfactory.
As contracts on the six state aid roads included in the construction bids on Friday will not be let until April 6th, the matter may again be brought before the Board by those interested.
