### WHAT OUR PUBLIC SCHOOLS ARE DOING

Elaborate preparations are being made by the class of 1923 to entertain the seniors and members of the high school faculty. A fine banquet is being prepared and a splendid program will be given.

A considerable portion of the chimney on the Lafayette school building fell down Monday noon. The bricks knocked several holes in the roof, which was already in a somewhat leaky condition, and the noise frightened those who were in the building. Fortunately there were no children near by so no one was hurt.

The drainage system on the north side has been unsatisfactory for a number of years. During spring thaws and summer showers water in the sewer backs up into the Lafayette school making conditions very uncomfortable. The matter was presented to the city council Monday night by a committee of parents and school board members. The council is doing all in their power to have the situation remedied and have in mind a plan which will work out satisfactorily if put in operation.

The big master clock in the high school office went on a strike at two o'clock Tuesday morning. We have been unable to get it to work satisfactorily since. When this clock stops the entire Junior-Senior high school program is disrupted, so we are making frantic efforts to have the matter adjusted.

Pupils of the Lafayette school will present the operetta "The Crystal Queen" on Friday afternoon and evening, May 12th. The matinee will be given at 4 o'clock for the benefit of school children and parents who cannot come in the evening. The evening charge will be 25c. and the money taken in will be used for equipping a room in the Lafayette school. Much hard work has been done toward making this operetta a success and we feel sure that it will be thoroughly enjoyed by everyone.

The regular monthly meeting of the Lafayette Parent Teachers Association was held May 5th. A good program of readings and music was presented by the pupils, and talks were given by Rev. W. H. Stowe and Supt. Brohaugh. Mr. Stowe discussed the problem of city and school planning in a very able manner. A committee was appointed to ask the council for more adequate sewer facilities for the Lafayette school. Another committee was appointed to look into the matter of religious instruction to school pupils during school hours. The meeting as a whole was a very good one and the mothers present entered into the discussions. At the close of the meeting a substantial lunch was served by the following committee: Miss Erlanson and Mesdames N. H. Nelson and H. C. Larson.
