10-All ages to 15 years. Three prizes for most novel makeup on foot.

11-All ages to 15 years. Three prizes for most original makeup on foot.

JULY 19 TO BE A BIG DAY AT MORRIS FARM SCHOOL

Farmers and business men of Western Minnesota are invited to the West Central School of Agriculture at Morris on the morning of Wednesday, July 19th, to meet with the Board of Regents of the University, the editors of the leading agricultural papers of the Middle West and the University Experiment Station Staff to inspect over 2,000 experimental plots, the herds and flocks and the equipment of the school.

KNOW YOUR WHEAT

Farmers of Kandiyohi County to be Taught Grain Grading by Federal Department

In order that the farmers of Kandiyohi County may know the market value of their grain before marketing the Federal Department of Agriculture will begin soon its "Know Your Wheat" campaign. This campaign will be conducted in part as a market news service.

The extension officials of Minnesota and the Dakotas held a conference recently with Dr. H. C. Taylor of the Federal Department of Agriculture and a decision was reached to carry on this campaign at the beginning in the following Minnesota counties: Kandiyohi, Kittson, Marshall, Clay, Norman, Traverse, Renville, Lac qui Parle, Wilkin and Ottertail.

These counties will be given the first opportunity under the proposed project. The plan is one originated with the Federal Department. This campaign should have its value along business lines for the farmers and has a great instructive value for even the general public.
