**STARBUCK FALLS BEFORE WILLMAR**

**Pope County Team Fails to Hold the Old Pill Last Sunday on Local Grounds**

The locals turned the trick on the fast Starbuck team last Sunday by giving them a trimming of a score of 10 to 6. Christian was on the mound for Willmar for five and one third frames and was relieved by "Bob" Johnson who hurled the remainder of the contest, holding the opponents hitless and runless. Eight hits were secured of Roy H. Anderson who was on the slab for the visitors. He had poor support, seven batters being safe on teammates errors.

Starbuck commenced in great style with three runs on three hits and a fumble. But Willmar commenced their first chapter by doing the same with two better. These tallies were brot across on three bagger and four fumbles. Starbuck scored their last two markers on a couple of safe hits and two errors in the fifth. Willmar scored three runs in the sixth period on two singles and another pair of fumbles.

Starbuck has played fourteen games, winning eight.

**FIRST INNING**

Starbuck—Holte was out on a fly to Kiely. Stenson lifted the pill over second to center for a single. Williams was safe on a fumble by Hannon. Lee soaked the old apple for a two ply to center garden, Stenson marking. P. Anderson murdered the pill by landing it close to fence in left center for a three bagger, Williams and Lee tallying. Skaug drove a grounder to Kiely, who threw home and caught P. Anderson. Skaug was caught stealing when Gleason pegged to Kiely. 3 runs, 3 hits, 1 error.

Willmar—Gleason was safe on error by second baseman who made a bum throw to first, went second on pitcher's overthrow of first. Hart was given a base on balls. Benda hit to third which forced Gleason out at that bag. Kiely cracked a two bagger to left, Hart scoring. Hannon dumped a two bagger to left, Benda and Kiely marking. Mulock whiffed. Berry was safe on third's fumble and later took second. Mattson lifted a fly to center which went for a two base hit, Hannon and Berry scoring. Mattson went third when the center fielder made a poor throw to short who covered second. Christian fanned. 5 runs, 3 hits, 4 errors.

**SECOND INNING**

Starbuck—H. Anderson out, Christian to Mulock. Dullum was handed four straight balls. Thompson struck out. Holte out, Hart to Mulock. No runs, no hits, no errors.

Willmar—Gleason grounded out to first. Hart slammed the apple to left center for a three base hit. Benda out, second to first, Hart tallying. Kiely fanned. 1 run, 1 hit, no errors.

**THIRD INNING**

Starbuck—Stenson hit a fast grounder which bumped off Mulock's glove to Kiely who threw him out to Christian who occupied first. Christian hurt his foot during this play. Williams flied out to Hart. Lee fanned but Gleason dropped third strike and was thrown out to Mulock. No runs, no hits, no errors.

Willmar—Thompson was changed from right field to second base. Williams was transferred from second to

right garden. Hannon was safe on third's error when he made a bum throw to first which pulled the first man off the bag. Mulock was called out on three strikes. Berry cracked the pill to left for a two bagger. Mattson hit a fast one to second who threw home but failed to get Hannon who scored. Christian flied out to pitcher who threw to first to get Mattson who ran to second on the fly. 1 run, 1 hit, 1 error.

**FOURTH INNING**

Starbuck—P. Anderson lifted the old apple to the Capital Shoe sign in center garden for a homer. Skaug grounded out to Mulock. H. Anderson out, Hannon to Mulock. Dullum was called out on three strikes. 1 run, 1 hit, no errors.

Willmar—Gleason was handed a pass. Hart sacrificed, pitcher to 1st. Benda was safe on first's error when he missed throw from short, Gleason going third. Kiely fanned. Benda went second, Hannon fanned but catcher dropped ball and was thrown out at first. No runs, no hits, 1 error.

**FIFTH INNING**

Starbuck—Thompson was safe on Hannon's overthrow of first base. Thompson stole second. Holte was safe on Hart's fumble. Holte went second. Stenson lifted a sacrifice fly to Berry. Thompson scoring, Berry threw to Gleason who threw to Hannon who caught Holte at third. Williams safe on infield hit to third. Lee pounded the pill to right field for three bases, Williams tallying. P. Anderson out, Kiely to Mulock. 2 runs, 2 hits, 2 errors.

Willmar—Mulock out, short to 1st. Berry whiffed. Mattson was hit by pitched ball, Mulock ran for him. Christian was given four balls, Kiely ran for him. Gleason out, second to first. No runs, no hits, no errors.

Willmar—Hart out, second to first. Benda cracked a single over short to center. Kiely slammed the pill to center for a fly but was safe when center gardener dropped it. Kiely started going second and was safe at second when short made a poor throw to first, Benda went third. Hannon fanned but the catcher dropped the third strike and overthrew first, Benda and Kiely tallying. Hannon went second. Mulock was called out on three strikes. Berry lifted a single to center, Hannon marking. Mattson called out on three strikes. 3 runs, 2 hits, 3 errors.

**SEVENTH INNING**

Starbuck—Stenson out, Kiely to Mulock. Williams fanned but Gleason dropped third strike and tossed him out at first. Lee walked, later took second. P. Anderson out on a fly to Johnson. No runs, no hits, no errors.

**EIGHTH INNING**

Willmar—Johnson smacked the pill to center for a safe hit. Gleason was safe on pitcher's mile high throw to first, Johnson went third and Gleason took second. Hart flied out to left. Benda was called out on three strikes. Kiely was also called out on three strikes but started an argument as two strikes were called on him when he was not in batter's position. Gleason thinking he was out left second for players' bench and was put out by catcher. No runs, 1 hit, 1 error.

Starbuck—Skaug was hit by pitched ball. H. Anderson was passed. Dullum, Thompson and Holte fanned in succession, the latter two failed to strike at the third strike. No runs, no hits, no errors.

Willmar—Kiely and Hannon were victims of infield cuts via the Stenson-Holte division. Mulock fouled out to catcher. No runs, no hits, no errors.
