

GLACIER TRAIL GOATS HERE FRIDAY

Program and Pictures Shown at Courthouse Friday Evening to Large Crowd

The team of goats with the drivers and a truck bearing camping equipment and two men came to town Friday evening. The goats were drawing a miniature prairie schooner and composed an advertising adventure which has proved tremendously successful. The goat team and outfit is advertising the Glacier Trail which passes thru Willmar from St. Louis, Mo., to Glacier National Park.

The goats, men and truck arrived at Willmar from the Twin Cities on Friday at four o'clock. The expedition attracted much attention. The goats were parked near the Ford Service Station and hundreds came to view the queer sight.

In the evening a program was given at the courthouse lawn. The drivers of the goats gave short talks about their trip which when completed will be over 1800 miles. Movies were shown the boys having their own machines. These were enjoyed by the large crowd which attended. The expedition left Willmar the following day going west.

The truck carries all the equipment and the two drivers take their shifts in driving the team. When the weather becomes too hot for the goats to endure they are taken with their prairie schooner up into the truck and given a ride.

The outfit must reach the park by Sept. 15th. The truck will make up any lost time on the road.

BIG FOUR AND SWITCHMEN TALK

Sioux City Railroad Men Pledge Support to Striking Craftsmen

WHEREAS, The Railway Shop Crafts are now on strike and are fighting not alone their own battle but also the battles of the transportation Brotherhoods, and,

Whereas, The Shop Crafts are seeking to establish the rule that laws are equally applicable to the railroads and their executives as they are to railway employees, and,

Whereas, Selfish financial interests are determined to disorganize and break up organized labor and do away with all the benefits accruing to labor as the result of the efforts of many years, and,

Whereas, The Shop Crafts are fighting for a living wage, just working rules and favorable working conditions and their success will mean the eventual betterment of working conditions of railway transportation employees,

Therefore, Be It Resolved, by the undersigned local Railway Organizations in joint meeting held at the Labor Temple in Sioux City, Iowa, on the 23d day of July, 1922,

That the undersigned organizations and the individual members thereof pledge to the Shop Crafts moral and financial support and all legitimate aid during the present strike, with the trust that those Crafts will persevere until completely successful;

That each and every member of the undersigned local organizations should give to the Local Chairman one day's pay for each month that the Shop Crafts continue on strike, the fund so raised to be paid to the strike committee of the Federated Shop Crafts of Sioux City and by that committee to be used in manner deemed best to further the interests of the men now on strike.

That a copy of this resolution to be sent to the Secretary of the Federated Shop Crafts of Sioux City and the public be notified of this action thru the press.
