Johannes Magnuson, an Old Pioneer of Fahln Twp., Passes Away at Kandiyohi

Johannes Magnuson passed away at his home in Kandiyohi Tuesday October 31st.



Death was due to heart failure after a two week's illness.

Johannes Magnuson was born in Östra Torås parish, Småland, Sweden, on December 27, 1839.

On June 23, 1868, Mr. Magnuson was united in marriage to Miss Gustava Hakansson at Swede Lake in Chicago county.

The deceased is mourned by two sons, John Edward and Frank Henry, both of Fahln township.

The funeral will take place on Friday afternoon at two o'clock from the house in Kandiyohi and later from the church in Tripolis.

The deceased was well liked by all his fellowmen and his death is a severe blow to all the community.
