

Americans Can Save Millions Of Russians With Clothing, Is Report Made By A. R. A. Workers



A shipload of textile materials provided by relatives and friends in the United States for the ragged of Russia and the Ukraine through the clothing remittance plan of the American Relief Administration, has sailed from New York.

Forty thousand of these clothing material packages were aboard American Relief Administration workers will deliver them to the shivering in every part of Russia and the Ukraine. They will reach by fastest possible delivery the persons for whom they have been designated by the sympathetic relatives and friends in America. Other shipments will follow.

Herbert Hoover, Chairman of the A. R. A., inaugurated the clothing package system, which is similar to the food remittance that has saved millions of lives, after it had been reported to him that thousands of children were unable to face the cold Russian winter with their scanty garments and that many in almost every community could not come to the feeding kitchens to get their daily ration.

The clothing material packages may be bought from the American Relief Administration, 42 Broadway, New York City, in twenty dollar units. Purchasers may designate to

whom they wish them sent and the A. R. A. will deliver them. Each twenty dollar package contains nearly five yards of dark warm wool cloth, sufficient for one suit for an adult and two garments for a child; 4 yards of lining; 16 yards of muslin sufficient for 4 suits of underwear; 8 yards of flannelette sufficient for two men's shirts or women's shirt waists and buttons and thread to make up these garments. Packages bought for forwarding to Russia not marked for any designated individual will be given to the most needy cases, and the A. R. A. has asked for general relief gifts through this medium.

APPOINTED MEMBER OF STATE DENTAL BOARD

Dr. C. E. Gerretson of Willmar Appointed by Gov. Preus for a Term of 3 Years

WILLMAR WINS OVER MINNEOTA

Willmar Comes Back Strong After Defeat at St. Cloud and Triumphs Over Minneota

After the crushing defeat received at St. Cloud the night before the local high school team came back strong and defeated the fast Minneota team by a 22 to 8 score in the game played on Saturday evening at the local gym.

Minneota lined up on the floor for their annual tussle against the locals with Werry, Minneota star forward, who thrilled the crowd in the annual meet last year, again in the lineup.

At the beginning of the game both teams were unable to score. Minneota at first seemed lost on the large floor but they soon overcame this disadvantage by taking a two point lead on Willmar when the flashy Tibbets rolled in a basket after four minutes of play. The game was tied immediately after as Melville Johnson dropped in a pretty one from the middle of the floor. Monson added another in quick succession from under the basket. Minneota has a good fast team and the men worked well together. By means of their short, snappy, passes they were able to work the ball down the floor but with Westgaard and Linn at the lower end of the floor they were not always able to score. A number of shots were missed, however, by both teams, neither of them shooting as accurately as they should. Willmar, too, was unable to run up a big score as Minneota played a five man defensive game, desiring to hold Willmar's score down. The score at the end of the quarter was 4 to 2 in the home team's favor.

In the second period, as in the first, the teams were unable to score in the first few minutes but Westgaard broke the spell when he worked down thru Minneota's defense and put the ball thru the ring after a nice pass from Monson. Monson added another field goal soon after. After that Willmar sent a number of counters thru the hoop. The half ended with Willmar leading with a 14 to 2 score.

In the third quarter the two teams played on nearly even terms, each side getting one basket. Davis made the one for Willmar and W. Johnson for Minneota. This made a standing of 16 to 4 at the end of the quarter.

In the last quarter, Wright, Rykken, Elmer Johnson, Maynard Johnson and Erickson appeared on the floor. This bunch gave a good account of themselves at the scoring end of the game, three baskets being made, but they also let each of the Minneota forwards slip thru and get a basket. Maynard Johnson put in a pretty one and it was soon followed by one from Elmer Johnson. Elmer added another one from way out on the floor just as the whistle blew. The final score was 22 to 8 in Willmar's favor. Both teams played clean basket ball, no fouls being called.

Minneota has a dandy little team with two good forwards in Tibbets and Werry. Werry, the small, covered the floor well and mixed in all the plays. The only thing that he could not do was to get the tip off of Monson, the local center. Johnson, Peterson and Smith played a fine defensive game and it was largely due to them that Willmar did not run up a higher score.
