 the constant growth of our population the result is that laborers are always abundant in the United States. The great problem to be solved is to find profitable employment for all our people. To do this we should manufacture all the goods we possibly can, grow all the products of the farm we possibly can, produce all the ore from our mines we possibly can, and furnish labor for our own people at the best wages that can possibly be paid.
 Do not forget this! Wages paid to our own people remain here in our own country. An article produced by our citizens costs the nation, as a nation, very little. The same article bought from any other country takes from our nation the entire amount sent abroad for such an article. If then it be true that the system of protection is the very best system for our entire people, I submit to Mr. Campbell that he must give his allegiance to any system which upon the whole is best for all, rather than consult what may seem best for himself in some single instance. It may seem to him that he is compelled to pay an extra price for some given article, but if in doing that his wages are kept at so high a price that he can afford to pay that little difference and still have a large balance left for other uses, then it is surely much better for him, even looking at it from his own selfish point of view, to pay the higher price and insure his own higher wages.

In closing this article I desire to repeat again that the Protective Tariff is always levied for the benefit of the many and not for the purpose of aiding a few. A man, or a company of men, may invest \$1,000,000 in building up some great manufacturing enterprise in the United States. Capital so invested is entitled to a fair profit for its use, and only to a fair profit. Such a factory will employ very likely not less than 1,000 people. Every individual drawing money for his day's work is interested in having our laws so framed as to insure him fair wages for his work, and the people of the whole country are interested in having the markets for those products secured to our own manufacturers so that they can run constantly, and pay these big wages, because experience has shown us that such a course always insures cheap goods for the people who use them and a home market for the product of the farm. I wish my correspondent would carefully study this last paragraph and if he can come fully to comprehend its meaning he will never again repeat his worn-out free trade questions.
