If there is any honesty of purpose in this move, we heartily commend it, for Davis is capable of filling either station with honor and credit, but if it springs from that detestible political ring which runs the politics of this state and which is looking forward to robbing Mr. Davis of his seat in the senate, then we emphatically put our foot upon it as altogether undesirable. Let there be an understanding in the matter before it is too late.

The refusal of the German Reichstag to congratulate old Bismarck on the anniversary of his birth was in very poor taste. Bismarck was and is today the greatest son of Germany, the strongest champion of a united empire, and as Webster once said, when sublime virtues cease to be abstractions, when they become embodied in human character and exemplified in human conduct, we should be false to our own nature, if we did not indulge in the spontaneous effusions of our gratitude and our admiration. A true lover of patriotism delights to contemplate its purest models; and that love of country may well be suspected which affects to soar so high into the regions of sentiment as to be lost and absorbed in the abstract feeling, and becomes too elevated, or too refined, to glow with fervor in the commendation or the love of individual benefactors.

## BISMARCK'S BIRTH

Its Eightieth Anniversary Celebrated Throughout the Empire.

### CROWDS AT FREIDRICHSTADT

Exercises in All the Public Schools - A National Holiday.

BERLIN, April 2.—All the public and most of the private buildings are bedecked with flags and bunting in honor of the 80th birthday of Prince Bismarck. At all the schools the pupils assembled during the morning to hear special Bismarck addresses. The pupils were then given a holiday. Many busi-

ness houses are closed and all the main streets are crowded with sightseers. At the theatres there are special performances, with prologues appropriate to the day which is being celebrated.

At Freidrichstade, Prince Bismarck's home, many thousands of people have assembled to do him honor. One deputation consisted of 4,000 students from the various German universities.

### SMALLPOX IN THE UNITED STATES.

Three Hundred and Seventy-three Deaths Reported.

WASHINGTON, April 2.—The abstract of sanitary reports, as made by the surgeon general, shows the presence of smallpox in 21 states of the Union. Of the cities Milwaukee has the highest, recording 524 cases and 164 deaths; Philadelphia had 244 cases and 26 deaths; Chicago, 240 cases and 44 deaths; Washington, 51 cases and 9 deaths; St. Louis, 105 cases and 35 deaths; New York, 55 cases and 10 deaths. There appears to have been, all told, 373 deaths from smallpox in the United States during the winter.

### Received a Deputation.

WASHINGTON, April 1.—The president received a representative delegation of Chicagoans, who called in behalf of a number of leading citizens of Chicago, irrespective of party affiliations, to invite the president to a public reception intended to be tendered to himself and Mrs. Cleveland, as a sense of their appreciation of his steadfast insistence on the preservation of a sound national currency.

### Left for Shiloh.

ST. JOSEPH, Mo., April 2.—General B. M. Prentiss, one of the two surviving generals who took part in the battle of Shiloh, has left for the battlefield, to be present at the unveiling of the monument on April 5. General Prentiss will be the only one of the surviving generals present on this occasion.

### Big Cotton Shipment.

MEMPHIS, Tenn., April 1.—The Yazoo and Mississippi Valley freight trains pulled out for New Orleans with the largest shipment of cotton that ever left Memphis. It consisted of 10,521 bales, all billed through to Liverpool. The largest previous shipment was 6,175 bales.

### Fairly Large Cut.

MARSHFIELD, Wis., April 2.—The winter's cut of the Upham Manufacturing company figures a total of 14,000,000 feet, out of which 11,000,000 feet of pine was taken. Everything considered, the season, although short, turned out fairly well.

### Taylor Not Located Yet.

PIERRE, S. D., April 2.—Dispatches sent from here announcing the locating in Valparaiso, Chili, of Taylor, the defaulting state treasurer, do not seem upon investigation to have good foundation. No one can be located who has heard any such report.

### Nine Cars Destroyed.

HAMILTON, Ont., April 2.—At an early hour there was a pitch-in on the Grand Trunk railway near this city. Two of the freight trains were wrecked and three men were seriously, though not fatally wounded. Both trains were thrown off the track and nine cars were destroyed by fire.

### Two Men Missing.

SAN DIEGO, Cal., April 2.—Deputy County Assessor L. D. Bailey of Julian and F. B. Brackett of this city are missing and it is feared that they have been murdered. Brackett went out to collect taxes and it is said they had several hundred dollars in their possession. Their horses have arrived at Julian, where the gravest apprehensions exist.

### Agreed on a Scale.

ALEXIA, Ia., April 2.—After hard work and many concessions the miners and operators have agreed upon a schedule for the coming year.

### Blood Hounds on His Trail.

NASHVILLE, Tenn., April 2.—While Ed Vest, a horse thief, was being taken off a train, he fired into a crowd, mortally wounding a boy named Powers. He then made his escape. Blood hounds have been put on his trail.


