## IT NEEDS NO SPONSOR

Pure Food Inspectors Will Accept Minnesota Sorghum.

Sorghum made in Minnesota will not be affected by the pure food crusade against adulterated syrups. It needs no sponsor and the dairy commission will not insist upon its being put up in packages labelled with its formula.

The adulteration of syrups has become a crying evil. In particular, maple syrup is a bad offender and it is so diluted by the manufacturers that it is practically all fraud but the taste. New Orleans molasses is an imposition nearly as great and soon a law will go into effect in this state requiring makers of syrup to attach a label to barrels and cans giving a complete list of the ingredients.

Not long ago a representative of a large syrup house and refinery was in New Ulm and during a visit to R. Pfeifferle's store noticed a barrel of sorghum which was made by a prominent farmer of Brown county. He cautioned Mr. Pfeifferle against the sale of the article, warning him that it would bring him trouble from the fact that it was not labelled.

Naturally Mr. Pfeifferle did not place great credence in his assurances and when J. G. Fowler, of the state dairy and food commission, was in the city Friday he laid the case before the inspector. Mr. Fowler stated that there

was no cause for alarm. He declared that the commission was convinced that the farmers of Minnesota made an honest syrup and for that reason there was no necessity for a label.

It was not their intention, he said, to make matters difficult for conscientious manufacturers and he did not anticipate trouble from the adulteration of the home product, from abuse of the privilege which the farmers will have accorded them.

## VOGEL WILL ENTER RACE

New Ulm Man After the State Treasurership.

Efficient Auditor Would Displace Julius Block.

Comments of the State Press on His Candidacy.

A short editorial in last week's Review brings out the fact that instead of the office of State Auditor, L. G. Vogel will try his hand at securing the nomination for the office of State Treasurer. A large number of his political friends have urged him to enter the race, led on perhaps by the fact that the present incumbent has had two terms and the opening appears to be good. After much hesitation Mr. Vogel consented to the Review using his name in this connection. As was stated last week he feels that he owes it to the party in the county to remain with it as candidate for county auditor until the completion of the work he has undertaken.

## DEATH OF "FORTY-NINER"

J. H. Lienhard Passes Away at Nauvoo, Ill.

Was Present at First Discovery of Gold in California.

Staked Out Claim and in Three Years Amassed a Fortune.

A. H. Lienhard of this city, received a telegram Saturday morning apprising him of the death of his father, J. H. Lienhard, which occurred at the latter's home in Nauvoo, Ill. Deceased was 83 years of age and had been in feeble health for the past five years. Mr. Lienhard had lived a long and active life and his career was one of more than usual interest.

Born in Bilten, Switzerland, he came to this county in 1841, when he had attained his twenty-first year, and at once determined to go west. In 1845, before the present city of St. Paul had been thought of, he visited Fort Snelling, but did not like the

as many of his friends have advised him.

It is apparent, however, that he would be foolish to turn down an opportunity to get on the state ticket, and it is certain that should that occur the ticket would have one man who would get votes. In this respect Mr. Vogel has led his ticket in this county in every election without exception, being the strongest of all the winning candidates.

In respect to ability, a more thorough and capable accountant could not be found and the experience of his long service as auditor gives him training that would fit him at once for the position of state treasurer. Friends of Mr. Vogel in this city will be pleased to forward his cause and had they the doing of it would write his name on the state ticket by unanimous consent.

Commenting upon his candidacy, editorially, the Minneapolis Journal of Saturday night had the following to say:

At last the second district has an avowed candidate for state office. As announced in the Journal yesterday, Louis G. Vogel of New Ulm, is in the field for the nomination for state treasurer. Mr. Vogel has been county auditor of Brown county for several terms, and bears a fine official record. He is very popular with the voters, having always run well ahead of his ticket. He possesses one requisite that is indispensable to the position to which he aspires—he is of German descent.

This makes three candidates for state treasurer, Block of Nicollet, the present incumbent, Schwarg of Dodge, and Vogel of Brown. All three of the southern congressional districts are represented. If the second gets in behind Vogel and supports him as a unit, he will be a dangerous factor in the convention. Block has had a good hold on the situation for some time, but the campaign is young yet. Those who figure on displacing Block must remember that he has a wonderful "displacement."
