

Hanska residents will form a citizen's telephone company, establishing an exchange in the village and running several rural lines into the adjoining country. The organization will be perfected at a meeting tonight.

Brown and Nicollet counties were the first to report the collections of the March settlement to the state auditor. Auditor Vogel sent in his report Wednesday and Auditor Freeman completed his abstract the same day.

New machinery is to be installed in the plant of the Sleepy Eye Milling company, according to the Dispatch of that place. When the improvements are completed the mill will have a capacity of 5,500 barrels daily.

During the coming summer the Minnesota Central Telephone company will string another wire between this place and Sleepy Eye. It will be used for through business, while the one now in place will handle the rural connections.

Christ Heller, of the firm of Heller & Gag, returned home Saturday from a two months' stay in Portland, Oregon, and other points on the Pacific Coast. While absent Mr. Heller saw and conversed with John Dengler, formerly of this city. The latter is planning to return to New Ulm this summer.

C. H. MacKenzie of Gaylord, county attorney of Sibley county and secretary of the Minnesota Central Railroad company, was in the city Monday. He is now in Mankato attending a meeting of the railway officials, they having gathered to arrange for starting the construction work on the new line.

The subject for the morning services at 10:30, Sunday in the Congregational church will be found in Rev. 21-22, "I, John, saw the Holy City; the New Jerusalem, coming down out of Heaven prepared as a bride adorned for her husband." In the evening an illustrated sermon: "Christ the Divine Teacher."

H. N. M. K. Armstrong, the St. James banker who failed some time ago, has been arrested on complaint of a former depositor, charged with receiving deposits into his bank after he knew it was insolvent. The accusation is the same as that for which Geo. S. Brainard, the Montgomery banker, was sentenced to two years in the state penitentiary.

Judge George received a telephone message from Hanska Saturday asking him to go to that village and examine a woman as to her sanity. As it was impossible for him to leave his office he was unable to comply. Later he was requested to go to Madelia and hold court but he informed the relatives of the demented woman that it would be necessary to call the probate judge of Watonwan county.

Eight inches of snow fell during the month of February and the total precipitation amounted to .8 inches. This is shown by the report of Voluntary Observer Andrew J. Eckstein, which also gives the mean temperature for the month as 10:13 degrees, with the maximum of 37 degrees above occurring on the 28th and the minimum of 22 below on the 8th. There were six clear, twenty partly cloudy and three cloudy days.

A new time card went into effect on the Chicago & Northwestern Sunday but it does not alter the schedule materially. Both the night trains are changed but only slightly. No. 501, whose arriving time has been 12:38 a. m., will reach New Ulm in future at 12:43, while No. 504, which formerly went east at 4 o'clock in the morning, will now depart at 3:42. The local passenger between Mankato and Tracy formerly went west as No. 5 and returned as No. 2. Its designation has been changed and it will now be known as No. 13 and No. 14.

Albert Moll, who was committed a year or two ago to the state hospital from Brown county, and shortly afterwards ran away, made his appearance at the institution last Tuesday, says the St. Peter Tribune, and asked to be admitted. Having no authority to admit him, Dr. Tomlinson telephoned Sheriff McMillan to come and get him, which he did, and after consulting Co. Attorney Stone, the man was taken before Judge Moll, and after an examination by Drs. G. W. McIntyre and J. W. Wells, was committed to the hospital for treatment.
