PRIMARY ELECTION CONDITIONS

That Awful "Ring" Conceived by The Journal and News. "Only County Politician" is Very Sore.

We all know there is only one "politician" in Brown county, and that is, according to his own estimate, P. Liesch. He would like to be a successful one, but somehow defeat has marked him for her own and so, like many defeated ambitious men, he gets himself on the sorehead list and attempts to disrupt his party.

This nightmare of a "ring" that disturbs him, is too silly to attract attention. The fact that year after year the people of the county have picked out the best men on the tickets of both parties and elected them with equally largemajorities, shows that the county, on county matters, is independent.

We hold that no county in the state has a better auditor than Louis G. Vogel. Speed and accuracy

have always characterized his work, and his books are models of neatness. He was elected on the republican ticket, and it is to the best interests of all the people that he be nominated by the republicans at their primary election on the 20th of September.

John Schneider, who came here from Springfield four years ago, and has figured largely in the business affairs of the county and city during that time, has shown that he has had no superior in the office of treasurer. He was elected each time on the democratic ticket, and if his party adherents give him the nomination he deserves, at the primaries, voters, regardless of party, should give him their support.

Wesley C. Miller has been designated, not only by republicans, but also by democrats, as the best man the office of Register of deeds has ever had. He was manly enough before the time of filing to say to his republican friends that if there was any reason why he should not be a candidate, or if there was any other whom they thought would be more acceptable, they would not have to kick him out, he would simply not file. He had the assurance that no fault could be found with his being the candidate of the party. Then the Liesch-Ochs-Schilling combination showed its head in his case, as well as in that of the county auditor, and induce opposition to file.

S. A. George is the last of the contested offices at the head of the list. There is no reason why the democrats should turn him down at the primaries, at least the News and Journal have found none, except to accuse him of being a member of their "ring." He is the "Grand Old Man" of the courthouse. An efficient officer and capable in the highest degree.

Among the others whom the Review, two weeks ago, urged to file and to whom the paper pledged its support, are Einar Hoidale, for County Attorney, democratic; Wm. J. Julius for Sheriff, republican; John Cutting for Supt. of schools, democratic; S. D. Peterson for Representative, republican. The present county commissioners should all be returned; nominated by their several parties and elected

by the people. With the exception of commissioner from the Fifth district none of the above candidates have opposition.

We have given as a reason for supporting a ticket of this nature, the fact that these men have proven themselves worthy the trust and confidence of the people. Others may be just as good; but when the cry is raised, "put good men in office" what does it avail to turn them out at the end of one or two terms.

There is nothing more absurd and silly than the statement made by the Journal that there is a collusion between these candidates. There can be none under the primary law. It is impossible. Any man with intellect enough to reason can determine that.
