

PASSES LIFE'S USUAL LIMIT

Mrs. Caroline Ottomeyer Dies at Seventy-Two.

Operation Brought Relief But Failed to Cure Her.

For Twenty-Three Years a Resident of This City.

After undergoing a delicate operation and living for twelve days thereafter, giving hope that she would ultimately recover, Mrs. Caroline Ottomeyer died Thursday evening and was laid to rest in the City cemetery Sunday afternoon.

Mrs. Ottomeyer has always had good health and has possessed a constitution that under ordinary circumstances would have lasted her many more years, but a derangement of the intestines necessitated an operation in the hope of effecting a cure. The operation was successful and to all appearances the wound was healing but her age was against her and she quietly passed away.

Her was a useful life and her mission seemed to be to do good to others. Never intruding upon the affairs of her neighbors or interfering in the matters that usually concern the people of the city, she was content to administer to her family and care for the wants of her three children, who were ever uppermost in her thoughts and affections.

It seemed to be her desire to live long enough to see that her boys had lived out the precepts of her early instructions and she has guarded them

with a jealous care. She was a member of the Friedens church and a conscientious believer in its teachings.

Mrs. Ottomeyer the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Beckmann was born in Wilberg, Lippe, Bernolde, Germany, September 24, 1833 and was therefore just 72 years of age at the time of her death. She married Christopher Ottomeyer and several years after his death, with her three children came to this country and to New Ulm, reaching here in 1882, where the family has since lived. The three children are living and were with her when she died. They are G. A., A. F. and Mrs. Fred Alpenberndt of Davis, Ill. Mrs. Simon Wellner and Mrs. Conrad Dirks are sisters of the deceased.

Funeral services were held at the home by Rev. C. Dahlmann and at the grave by Rev. E. F. Wheeler, the former pastor of the Friedens church and the latter pastor of the Congregational church.

Very many of the people of the city, friends of the family, making a long procession from the house to the cemetery, did honor to the remains of this excellent woman, whose life has been an example of true worthy and worthy of all acceptance to all those follow her.

LOVE LANDS HEGLER IN JAIL

Refusal of Woman to Marry him Leads to Crime.

Angry Lover Chases Women Into Church With Acid.

Bound Over to Grand Jury and is in Jail Without Bail.

With a bottle of strong carbolic acid in his pocket and crazed by the refusal of his lady love to marry him Valentine Hegler pursued two shrieking women down the main street of Sleepy Eye and forced them to take shelter in the Baptist church where the angry lover was induced to leave the women to themselves and return to his home.

Instead of going about his business and forgetting the sting of the woman's refusal, the young man went to a saloon and proceeded to drown his sorrow in drink, becoming talkative and upbraiding the woman for her treatment of his affections. He took the bottle from his pocket and dramatically explained that he was prepared to "fix" her.

One of the men present took the bottle from him and turned it over to the police and later the woman swore out a warrant for the arrest of Hegler and the charge of attempting to take her life. The next day County Attorney Hoidale went to Sleepy Eye and conducted the hearing before Judge Geschwind.

The woman in the case is Mrs. Olga Krueger, a divorced woman and the young man who is under twenty-five years of age is an employe in one of the livery barns. The hearing developed the fact that he claimed to have purchased the acid for suicidal purposes, and it was determined that if such was the case he better be in jail and he was locked up to await the action of the grand jury, and not allowed bail. The wounds to his feelings will probably have healed by that time and he will not be a menace either to himself or the woman.

The Sleepy Eye Herald says of the affair: The case was heard before Judge Geschwind, County Attorney Hoidale prosecuting the case. No one outside the interested parties were allowed in the court room. Mrs. Krueger testified that Hegler had gone to see her frequently and wanted to marry her. She also told the court that she had told Hegler that as soon as she obtained a divorce after New Year, that was time enough to talk about the marriage. She further told that Hegler had threatened her life if she married any one else. The latter statement was corroborated by two other witnesses who he had told that if she did not marry him, he would "stop her clock."

Hegler was put on the stand and denied that he meant any harm to her and said that the acid he had was for suicidal intents. He told a reasonable story and said he intended to drink the contents of the bottle. On hearing a half dozen other witnesses the defendant was bound over until the next term of district court in December.

Young Hegler is a young man of 24 years. He has lived in Sleepy Eye for three years and has always bore a good character, is well liked and always faithful in whatever he does. Much sympathy is expressed for him

by those who know him. He seems to be under the hypnotic influences of the woman. No sympathy on the other hand is expressed for Mrs. Krueger who is a married woman, and ought not to have imposed on young Hegler as she has done. This case will probably result in something being done by our authorities in the near future.

HEINZMAN LOSES \$3,000 BY FIRE

Juror in Koch Cases Suffers Loss For Convictions.

Telegrams to the daily papers on Monday contain the following statements: A crime that many people believe is directly traceable to the Koch murder trial at Mankato was committed in Lime township, Blue Earth county, early Sunday when incendiaries fired a barn belonging to Henry Heinzman, who was a member of the jury that acquitted the New Ulm dentist, now practicing in Minneapolis.


"When the third trial of the celebrated case was held at Mankato, Mr. Heinzman, who is a milkman residing three miles north of that city, proved acceptable to both sides, and was sworn as a juror. After the verdict of "Not Guilty" had been rendered. Juror Heinzman talked freely of the case, and his attitude was resented by persons believing in the guilt of Dr. Koch.

"Sunday morning Mr. Heinzman's barn took fire and was entirely destroyed. It is supposed that enemies he made, while the murder trial in progress, adopted this means of obtaining revenge. The blaze originated in the hay-loft, two stories above the ground, and this fact shows conclusively, it is argued, that it was the work of firebugs.

"Mr. Heinzman's loss will reach fully \$2,000, not including forty tons of hay and several hundred bushels of grain. Had he not succeeded in driving out his stock the loss would have been much greater."


NOTICE TO SEEKERS OF Free Homesteads in Canada
