HUNDRED KILLED

AT NUMBER OF BODIES RECOVERED FROM THE RUINS OF SAN FRANCISCO.

PROPERTY LOSS BY LARGE

HOW ESTIMATE HUNDRED MILLION DOLLARS.

THEY ARE RECEIVING FOOD

THEY NO LONGER ADD TO THE MISERY OF SURVIVORS OF THE DISASTER.

San Francisco, Cal., April 23.—A report reached here at midnight from San Francisco that a brisk fire is burning in South San Francisco. The illumination can readily be seen from this side of San Francisco bay, a distance of eight miles. It is believed that the fire broke out afresh from smoldering embers that could not be subdued on account of the lack of water.

When the fire was pronounced to be under control in San Francisco proper several frame buildings were standing in South San Francisco. It is now feared that these will be swept away.

San Francisco, Cal., April 23.—Had not been for the sight of the ruderous set up in the open air wherever San Francisco's homeless thousands were camped, one would have had difficulty in finding any of the cheerful associations of the Sabbath in this city during the day. Everywhere throughout the burned as well as the unburned section of the city there was the greatest activity. Streets were being cleared of debris, laborers were being broken water pipes, sewers and gas mains; electricians everywhere were seeking to untangle the almost hopeless confusion of wires; in San Francisco was in the first stages of its regeneration.

There are no hungry people now; the spectre of starvation has been banished by the magnificent relief work of the people of California aided by the entire nation in

general to the appeals that went out for assistance. Food by the carload and boatload has poured into Oakland in sufficient quantities to overwhelm the committee that has in charge its distribution.

Heavy Volume of Supplies.

So great was the volume of foodstuffs brought into the general depot at Oakland mole that the general committee during the day made an appeal for skilled labor in the handling of these supplies. Grocers, butchers and commission men have been requested to secure men who are familiar in the handling of foodstuffs in order that the confusion attendant upon the distribution at the scores of stations established might go on without confusion.

The homeless people are no longer obliged to subsist upon bread and canned stuff entirely, as they had been during the previous days of their trying experience, but during the day were given hot coffee, canned meats and even cakes and oranges. Oranges have come in plentiful supply from Southern California and the sight of California's famous product was everywhere hailed with words of delight.

It must not be understood by the charitable people of the country that there is a surfeit of food for the sufferers. While the supply is abundant at this writing, it is well for the public to remember that the homeless thousands must be fed and cared for by the organized relief committee for an indefinite period. It is desired, therefore, that contributions be continued everywhere until the people who have been rendered helpless and destitute by the city's misfortune can care for themselves.

Water Situation Improved.

The water situation, while causing inconvenience to the people, is no longer such a problem. About two-thirds of the remaining section of the city is being supplied with sufficient water for the pressing domestic needs, but, of course, there is not yet enough to be had for fire-fighting purposes. Because of this fact the most stringent orders have been issued by the military and civil police that no fires shall be built within any house and no lights, not even a candle, can be shown at night in the houses. All cooking for the present must be done on the sidewalks or in the open streets and in daylight.

One of the noteworthy features of the situation is the remarkable promptness with which the work of systematically caring for the homeless has been thoroughly organized and put into operation. The conditions that existed two days ago, when the immense task of caring for the destitute and helpless people could not be organized quick enough to save thousands from hunger and possible epidemic, exist no longer.

The administration of the city's affairs is progressing most harmoniously. Mayor Schmitz and General Fun-

ston are working in perfect accord. There was some slight confusion Saturday owing to the misunderstanding of orders by some members of the national guard, but this has been minimized. The system put into force by the mayor and General Funston is working order out of confusion and the city is as orderly as before the fire. Permit orders having been issued by so many heads of departments, as has been the case during the past few days, there has been necessarily more or less conflict of authority. It is to be observed, however, that there has been no complaints made anywhere concerning the actions either of the troops or the municipal police. It is only of the national guards of the state of California that complaint has been made. Many citizens have reported many arbitrary acts of the militiamen.

Contributions of Money Continue to be Made from Every Part of the United States.

Chairman Phelan of the finance committee during the day reported additional subscriptions of about \$162,000, the largest of these being one of \$100,000 by the Chicago Commercial association. The finance committee will at once consider some plan for the use of the large sum of money that will soon be available for the relief of the sufferers.

Five Hundred Bodies Found.

The total number of bodies recovered and buried up to Sunday night is 500. No complete record can be had at this time, as many bodies have been buried without permits from the coroner and the board of health. The searchers of the coroner's and the board of health departments found not more than twenty bodies Sunday. They were buried immediately. A few of these bodies could be identified and the graves were marked by numbers. It is impossible at the present time to obtain any sort of death list or even to make a reliable estimate of the number of casualties. Whenever a body is found it is buried immediately without formality and as these burials have been made at widely separated parts of the city by different searchers who do not even make a prompt report to headquarters, considerable confusion has resulted in estimating the number of casualties. Exaggerated reports have resulted.

The health of the scores of thousands camped in the open air is, under the circumstances, remarkably good. There have been several cases of pneumonia reported and colds are quite common, but there is nothing like an epidemic of pulmonary trouble. The board of health reports that there is very little contagious disease. For the treatment of such cases hospitals have been provided. The Golden Gate park district during the day reported the birth of eighteen babies. The mothers and children were removed to the various maternity hospitals.

Vigorous Measures Taken.

Vigorous measures are being taken by the board of health and the board of public works to improve sanitary conditions, which, while not entirely satisfactory, in general are not as yet a serious menace to health. The turning on of considerable water in the residence district Sunday and a promise of much more within a few hours will relieve the minds of those living in houses of the fear of disease. But the thousands camped in the parks and on every bit of open ground must receive prompt attention. The work at these places is in the hands of the engineers of the United States army and under their efficient direction is progressing satisfactorily. Eight temporary structures have been erected at Golden Gate park and in these sheds thousands found reasonably comfortable shelter during the night. More of these buildings will soon be ready.

The Associated Press representatives during the day covered the entire burned section. The circumference of the area, as near as could be ascertained by the marking of a cyclometer, is twenty-six miles and comprises the business district and a large section of the residence district, all of which was densely populated.

Extent of the Burned Area.

The extent of the burned area is seven square miles. It is estimated by competent insurance authorities that the loss will aggregate \$300,000,000, and on this vast amount of property the companies carried approximately \$175,000,000 insurance.

Chief Dinan of the San Francisco police has sent telegrams to the police authorities of all California cities requesting them to take measures to prevent people from leaving their respective towns and coming to San Francisco out of idle curiosity. He asked them to impress the fact that by coming here they are simply running a chance of being put to work at clearing away the debris of burned buildings or repairing sewers. This does not apply to skilled workmen, who will be welcomed by the committee if they will lend their aid in carrying out the urgent needs of the street, sewer, plumbing, electrical, building and other departments of this nature.

Religious services were conducted by every denomination in the various parks and at every other place where people were in camp. Improvised altars were set in many places and the ceremonies carried out before thousands of earnest and devout worshippers.

Dead Bodies Cremated.

San Francisco, April 23.—Two hundred corpses found in the Potrero district, south of Shannon street near the Union Iron works, were cremated at Six Mile House Saturday by order of Coroner Walsh.

SANTA ROSA SUFFERED

ABOUT SIXTY PERSONS KILLED THERE AND MANY OTHERS ARE MISSING.

GREATER NUMBER INJURED

PEOPLE RALLY BRAVELY FROM GREATEST DISASTER IN CITY'S HISTORY.

Sacramento, Cal., April 23.—Santa Rosa, in proportion to its size, has suffered worse than San Francisco. The list of dead from Santa Rosa numbers about sixty but a great number of persons are missing and a still greater number are more or less seriously wounded.

As in the case of San Francisco, an admirable organization has the situation well in hand. Forty sailors from Mare Island, fully equipped with apparatus, are at work, while volunteer aid has been unstinted. Santa Rosa has suffered the greatest disaster in her history but the indomitable spirit of her people has been shown all along the line. Even so early as Friday an announcement was made that the public schools and the college would open as usual this week, the buildings having been inspected and found to be safe.

AT LEAST ONE HUNDRED DEAD.

Work of Taking Out Bodies From Insane Asylum Going On.

Sacramento, Cal., April 23.—A dispatch to the Tribune from Agnews, Cal., says:

The work of taking out the bodies of patients who were killed in the wreck of the insane asylum building is still going on. At the present time it is estimated that at least 100 are dead.

The cupola over the administration department went down and all the wards in that part of the building collapsed. Twelve attendants were killed and Dr. Kelley, second assistant physician, was instantly crushed to death. There were 1,100 patients in the hospital and C. L. Seardie, secretary of the state commission on lunacy, who has been here attending to official business, declares that it is a marvel that many more were not killed. Dr. T. W. Hatch, superintendent of the state hospitals for insane, is in charge of the work of relief. One hundred patients have been

transferred to the Stockton asylum. It is believed that forty or fifty tents have escaped.

PREPARING TO REBUILD

Business Men to Replace Ruined Structures.

San Francisco, April 23.—The most substantial business property owners of San Francisco are in consultation with architects. While the work away the debris goes forward draughtsmen will be engaged preparing plans for buildings to adorn the city.

It is understood that Janlan will be one of the first on Market street. His plan is complete, but call in general structure at Market and streets. Mr. Phelan recently chased the property adjoining reaching to Stockton street. Attention is to cover the entire front with buildings as soon as it is done. Practically every bank in San Francisco will be rebuilt. All of these institutions have eastern connections and many of them are affiliated with foreign banks. Owing to the great property of San Francisco, the local institutions, almost without exception have large deposits to their credit in New York and European capitals. This money will be available at once and after the strain of the moment has been relieved building operations will begin.

TRAINS NOW RUNNING.

First Mail for Outside Points Has Left San Francisco.

San Francisco, April 23.—San Francisco is not now without passenger transportation. Cars are running down Filmore street and appear to have plenty of power.

Trains are running on all lines practically on the regular schedule. Service on the coast line of the Southern Pacific company was resumed during the day and dispatches will now be made regularly. The first mail from San Francisco for outside points was sent out Saturday and since then all regular dispatches have been made.

Sickness on the Decrease.

San Francisco, April 23.—The board of health reports a very encouraging health condition, considering the circumstances. Sickness is constantly on the decrease. There are very few contagious diseases and these are being attended at the lodge in Golden Gate park. Sanitary conditions in the residence districts are being improved.

Chief Sullivan Dead.

San Francisco, April 23.—Chief D. J. Sullivan of San Francisco's fire department died during the day from the effects of injuries received on the morning of the earthquake.
