TO AID SITUATION

Taft Believes Immediate Tariff Revision Necessary.

EXPECTS ACTION BY JUNE 1

Does Not Favor Permanent Commission at Present.

New York, Feb. 26.—President-Elect Taft declared in an interview that a revision of the tariff is a primary requisite for the relief of the present business condition and he expressed the hope that the revision would be accomplished by June 1. Speaking of this revision Mr. Taft said:

"As this is the primary requisite for the relief of present conditions I want to have it disposed of at once. I am hopeful that there will be important revisions in the existing schedules made by congress in an extra session and I look forward to June 1 as the date when most of these changes will become effective."

Mr. Taft's opinion was given after an interview with James W. Van Cleave, president of the National Manufacturers' association, who called to urge the creation of a permanent tariff commission. After Mr. Van Cleave left Mr. Taft said he favored such a commission, but did not favor its immediate appointment. He said he felt that present tariff schedules are onerous to business, halting it with the force of a drag brake, but he added that the revision was all important first and then perhaps a commission. Such a commission, if appointed now, he said, might block the plan of revision as now contemplated.

After the revision the commission would gather other data, watch the new law's working and suggest amendments to it.

Mr. Taft told Mr. Van Cleave that he desired to have further information concerning a commission of tariff experts and would give it his every consideration. The present lull in industry, Mr. Taft said, was undoubtedly due to impending tariff legislation, but that he thought with that knowledge in view congress would conclude its deliberations at an early date.

SOCIAL LEADERS JAILED

English Suffragettes Refuse to Stop Demonstrations.

London, Feb. 25.—Refusing to give security for their future good behavior the women suffragists who were arrested while attempting to reach Premier Asquith to present to him a petition in the interests of the cause, were sentenced to imprisonment. Most of the terms were for one month. An exception was made in the case of Mrs. Pethick Lawrence, who, having a previous conviction against her, was sentenced to two months' imprisonment. Miss Lawless was among those given one month. Lady Constance Lytton, sister of Lord Lytton and daughter of the former viceroy of India, warned her friends that if they obtained her release by providing security she would repeat her offense.

Sentences were imposed upon about thirty women, including, in addition to the foregoing, Miss Stratford Dugdale, daughter of Commander Dugdale and cousin of the Hon. William W. Peel; Miss Solomon, daughter of the ex-premier of Cape Colony, and Mrs. Catherine Elizabeth Corbett, an aristocratic supporter of the movement.

BRITISH ARMY ESTIMATES

Appropriations Provide for 804,793 Men of All Forces.

London, Feb. 27.—The army estimates for 1909-10 provide for a grand total of 804,973 men, as compared to 799,610 men in 1908-9. This includes the regular force, which stands at 183,200 men, as compared to 185,000 men last year, as well as the reserves, the militia and the territorial forces. These are slightly above last year, but will be further increased by recent recruiting. Seventy-six thousand regulars for the Indian establishment also are included.

The gross total for the maintenance of the army is estimated at \$154,449,750, as compared to \$154,134,020 for 1908-9.

IN HIDING IN KENTUCKY

Tennessee Senators Run Away to Prevent a Quorum.

Hopkinsville, Ky., Feb. 27.—Eight of the thirteen runaway senators who secretly left Nashville to prevent a quorum in the Tennessee legislature are hiding in Hopkinsville from the sergeant-at-arms and deputies, who have warrants for their arrest. Others are in Alabama. They say they will continue these tactics indefinitely to prevent objectionable elections.


Bodies of Mother and Four Children in Burned Home.

Bakersfield, Cal., Feb. 26.—Mrs. M. W. Beekman, a widow, and her four children, residing seven miles from this city on the Union avenue road, lost their lives in a fire that destroyed their home. It is believed they were murdered and the house set on fire to hide the crime.

Taft's Cabinet Completed

Franklin MacVeagh Appointed Secretary of Treasury.

New York, Feb. 25.—President-Elect William H. Taft completed his cabinet by the offer of the treasury portfolio and its acceptance. That the offer was made to and accepted by

ATTACK ON ROOSEVELT

Cook of Colorado So Bitter House Stops Speech.

Washington, Feb. 26.—By an overwhelming vote, and without party distinction the house of representatives sustained the committee on appropriations in again reporting a provision in the sundry civil appropriation bill restricting the operations of the secret service detectives of the treasury department. The president was scathingly denounced by Mr. Cook (Rep., Colo.), while Mr. Smith (Rep., Ia.), a member of the appropriations committee and one of those named by the president in his message of Jan. 4, last, as being responsible for the secret service limitation, seemingly employed all the invective at his command in an attack on that service. He compared the secret service detectives with "common liars," declared them to be worthless and pointed to the assassination of President McKinley as a sample of the watchfulness and capacity of those men, one of whom, he said, stood at the president's side when he was shot down and failed to observe the approach of the assassin with his supposedly bandaged hand in full view.

Mr. Cook in the course of his remarks frequently referred to the president in most uncomplimentary phrases. So denunciatory of the president was Mr. Cook that he was denied the privilege of continuing his remarks after he had spoken but a few minutes.

DOZEN KILLED IN STORM

Disturbance Covers Large Section of the South.

Memphis, Tenn., Feb. 24.—That the storm of wind and rain which prevailed in Eastern Arkansas, Northern Mississippi and Western Tennessee was most severe is confirmed by latest advices. In the counties of Lenoire, Woodruff, Prairie and Poinsett, in Arkansas, the force of the storm, which apparently originated in the first named county, was felt. The town of Fisher, in Poinsett county, was practically destroyed, reports stating that but two buildings remain intact, while six persons were killed and a number of others sustained more or less serious injuries.

Near Augusta the dead number six. In Lenoire a child was killed.

SURRENDERED BY BONDSMEN

Beach Hargis Must Remain in Jail Pending Second Trial.

Jackson, Ky., Feb. 27.—The men on the bond of Beach Hargis, who is charged with the murder of his father, Judge James Hargis, surrendered him to Breathitt county officers and he was arrested and taken to the jail at Irvine, Ky., to await his second trial in April. The first trial resulted in a hung jury. Hargis' recent outbreaks, in which he created a reign of terror, is said to have caused his bondsmen to surrender him.

IN BATTLE WITH OFFICERS

One Alleged Thief Killed and Another Fatally Wounded.

New Orleans, Feb. 27.—In a running fight between detectives and Italian thieves here one of the thieves was killed and another fatally wounded. Two other men alleged to be implicated in the robbery were captured.

Idle Cars Number 300,000.

Chicago, Feb. 27.—The surplus freight cars in the United States have only decreased 130 in the last two weeks, according to a report issued by the car efficiency committee of the American Railway association. The total number of idle cars shown is 301,441.

DIES IN COMMITTEE PRISON FOR LIFE

Bill Granting Statehood to New Mexico and Arizona.

CHARGES AGAINST OFFICIALS

Sensational Statements Made to Delay Action.

Washington, Feb. 27.—There will be no statehood legislation for New Mexico and Arizona at the present session of congress. At a meeting of the senate committee on territories all members, regardless of party, in a sensational scene, abandoned consideration of the house bill.

The members of the committee left the room without any one suggesting further meetings for its consideration. This remarkable action occurred at the conclusion of the reading of statements presented by Senators Nelson and Beveridge charging corruption, jury bribing and various other offenses against certain officials and leaders of what was termed the "gang which is in control of political affairs in New Mexico."

Among the statements read was a telegram from J. J. Hagerman, former governor of New Mexico, reflecting on the character of the people who are in control of political affairs of that territory and declaring that these men expect to continue their control after the territory becomes a state.

He suggested that it would be well to wait until after the next census before admitting New Mexico to statehood.

Another statement was read recounting the difficulties experienced by Ormsby McHarg, who went to New Mexico in 1907 as an agent of the department of justice to prosecute land frauds. This statement declares that Mr. McHarg was hampered in his work by Governor Curry and his attorney general, Judge A. B. Fall.

MAXIMUM FINE \$720,000

Standard Oil Offenses May Be Limited by Court.

Chicago, Feb. 25.—United States District Judge Anderson broadly intimated that he will rule that the unit of offense in the Standard Oil rebating case will be the thirty-six settlements of freight charges. Under this ruling, if made, a fine of only \$720,000 is possible as compared with Judge Landis' assessment of \$29,240,000 in the original case. The court said after listening to the arguments:

"I think that there can be no more convictions than there have been settlements, wherein the carrier and the shipper have settled their accounts and the shipper has received back the difference between the valid rate and the rate which was a concession. Of these settlements there were thirty-six."

IN GOULD DIVORCE CASE

Mrs. Ben Teal Convicted of Subornation of Perjury.

New York, Feb. 26.—Mrs. Margaret Teal, wife of Benjamin Teal, one of the best known theatrical managers in this country, was convicted of attempted subornation of perjury in the divorce case of Helen Kelley Gould against Frank J. Gould. Mrs. Teal was sentenced to serve one year in the penitentiary on Blackwells Island.

As Mrs. W. C. Toomey Mrs. Teal was plaintiff in a sensational breach of promise case against Dr. J. W. Bettington at St. Paul about two years ago. Toomey, her first husband, was private secretary to James J. Hill.

ALL GIVEN LIFE SENTENCES

Three Men Convicted of Stealing Forty-six Cents.

Chicago, Feb. 27.—Three holdup men accused of the theft of 46 cents were sentenced to life terms in the penitentiary by a jury in Judge Kersten's court. This sentence was made possible by the passage of a law two years ago providing the severe penalty inflicted for highway robbery committed with the aid of deadly weapons.

UNREST IN CENTRAL AMERICA

State Department Wants Warships Sent to West Coast.

Washington, Feb. 26.—Because of reports of uneasiness in Central America growing out of important military activity in Nicaragua the state department has asked that one or more naval vessels be sent to Amapala, on the west coast, to watch developments and report on the situation.

Castro Denies the Charge.

Dresden, Feb. 27.—Cipriano Castro, late president of Venezuela, has declared his innocence of the charge that he had conspired to bring about the assassination of Juan Vicente Gomez, the present president of the republic.

Balloting Without Result.

Madison, Wis., Feb. 25.—The seventeenth joint ballot of the Wisconsin legislature for United States senator resulted in no election. Stephenson received 57 out of 124 votes cast; necessary for choice, 63.

MINNEAPOLIS MURDERER PLEADS GUILTY TO CHARGE.

Andreas Gombosi was sentenced at Minneapolis to state prison for life for the murder of August Bayer, whom he lured to a secluded spot on the outskirts of that city and shot in the back in an attempt to rob him on Jan. 13.

ALIENISTS SAY HE IS SANE

Lured His Victim to a Secluded Spot and Shot Him.

Andreas Gombosi was sentenced at Minneapolis to state prison for life for the murder of August Bayer, whom he lured to a secluded spot on the outskirts of that city and shot in the back in an attempt to rob him on Jan. 13.

Appearing before Judge John Day Smith of the Hennepin county district court Gombosi was allowed to withdraw his plea of not guilty and substitute one of guilty to murder in the second degree.

Alienists and police officers agreed that the prisoner could not successfully plead insanity.

In answer to the usual questions from the court Gombosi said he was born in Russia and that his parents and four brothers are still living there. He was apprenticed to a cabinet maker when he was fourteen years old and worked at that trade for eight years. He then came to America and drifted about from one job to another, finally landing in Minneapolis.

OLD SOLDIER IN RIDING TEST

Dr. J. A. Throckmorton Will Try to Beat Record Made by Roosevelt.

Dr. J. A. Throckmorton of Sidney, O., is completing arrangements to make a 120 mile horseback ride in eighteen hours, thereby hoping to beat the record recently made by President Roosevelt in covering ninety-eight miles in the same length of time. It is the intention of Dr. Throckmorton, who is an old soldier, to utilize six horses on the trip. The doctor is past sixty years of age.

He will first ride from Sidney to Dayton, a distance of forty miles, and return and then ride to Troy, twenty miles distance, and return, making a total of 120 miles.

Dr. Throckmorton is a lover of fine horses and always has a couple of Kentucky thoroughbreds in his stables for riding purposes. He served in the war, acting as scout in the Union army.

DASH OF LYE KILLS INFANT

Little Girl Throws Cup of Powerful Liquid on Baby.

Mrs. Duseman of Parkersburg made some liquid lye with which she intended to scrub the kitchen floor. In a cradle was a five-months-old baby. Playing about the home was a three-year-old sister. The mother stepped out for a few moments, leaving the lye where the older child could reach it. When she returned she found the little baby in terrible agony. The sister had secured the lye and had playfully thrown some of the liquid on the baby. Physicians were called, but the little one died a short time after in fearful agony.
