New Ulm is to have the Orammer-gaertheatergesellschaft who will play here on March 3rd and 4th. Rudolph Duering, the advance agent was in the city on Tuesday and made arrangements with Manager F. W. Johnson of the Turner Theatre for their appearance in our city on the above named dates. This will prove agreeable news to the friends of the Bavarian plays.

For the past week a petition has been circulated which will be presented to the City Council at the next regular meeting or sooner, if a special meeting is held. About 300 of the voters and tax payers have signed it now and more names are being added to the list daily. The petition asks the city council to submit to the voters at the annual spring election the proposition of issuing \$15,000 bonds to aid in the construction of an armory. Under existing laws, the state contributes \$10,000 toward the construction of an armory. A bill now pending, if enacted into a law, will increase this amount to \$15,000. Co. "A" has been granted the state aid and they hope that in about 4 years the same amount will also be available for the Machine Gun Company. In that event, as the friends of the movement say, the City would be called on to loan this money for armory purposes for but a short number of years.

We are pleased to be able to report that Ed. He suffered painful burns and a slight concussion of the brain from which he is now quite rapidly convalescing. The well-house was burned to the ground, entailing a loss of about \$300, fully covered by insurance.


