Henry N. Aamott, a former resident of Sleepy Eye, but now engaged in the drug business at St. Paul, was arrested at the latter place by Sheriff W. J. Julius Thursday, and brought to New Ulm. Friday afternoon, Aamott was to have been arraigned before District Judge I. M. Olsen on a charge of having failed to provide the proper and necessary support for his eight-year-old child, but the case was settled out of court. The man was arrested on complaint of his wife, who was represented by Attorney Albert Hauser of Sleepy Eye, where she and the child make their home.
