DENVER DIGGING OUT OF DRIFTS

Partial Resumption of Traffic Restored.

SEVERAL PERISH IN THE CITY

Reports From Mountainous Sections of the State Indicate Possible Loss of Life.

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+ FORTY-FIVE INCHES OF SNOW +
+ IN DENVER. +
+ Denver, Dec. 8.—From Monday morning when the recent snow storm actually began, + until it ended Friday night, + 45.2 inches of snow fell, making 4.16 of moisture. From Thursday morning to Friday night not quite 41 inches of snow came down. + This is a new record for the entire West if not for the country. +

Denver, Dec. 8.—Cloudless skies greeted residents of Denver and suburbs as they resumed the task of digging their way through the heavy snow.

The first efforts were to restore a partial street car service and resume the delivery of coal and food supplies.

While thousands of men worked with pick and shovel digging away the mass of snow and ice the police barred from the streets all vehicles except those needed to meet the city's immediate wants.

One was reported dead in Denver and several are still missing. Railroad traffic still was badly tied up, only one train from Cheyenne reaching the Union station. Officials say it will be another day before service is resumed.

Reports came from mountain points through the state of persons missing and of those who have been found unconscious in the snow by searching parties since the abatement of the storm which prevailed for two days. Two men were reported lost in Cheyenne mountain near Colorado Springs and searching parties on snowshoes have been unable to find trace of them.

VOTETHIRTEEN HOUR SESSION

Republicans Aid Democrats to Adopt Long Day Program.

Washington, Dec. 8.—Democratic senate leaders, with the aid of ten Republican votes, succeeded in forcing a program of thirteen-hour daily sessions for the currency bill.

Two hours' recess from 6 to 8 o'clock in the evening will be the only break in the daily work from 10 o'clock in the morning until 11 o'clock at night.

THREE SLAIN IN COPPER COUNTRY

Murders Arouse Indignation in Michigan Strike Zone.

Calumet, Mich., Dec. 8.—Arthur and Harry James, brothers, were killed, Thomas Dally died from his wounds and Mary Nicholson was injured seriously by rifle bullets fired in the apartment house in which they lived.

The James brothers came here from Toronto, Can., and obtained employment in the Copper Range Consolidated mine, whose men are among those on strike. They took up their abode with Dally, who was a miner and a boarding house keeper.

Miss Nicholson is the daughter of William Nicholson, who occupied the other side of the apartment house in which Dally lived.

All of the victims were in bed when shot. Three kinds of rifle bullets were imbedded in the walls of the house. Ten or twelve shots were fired and the difference in style of bullets led to the belief that at least three men did the shooting.

The murders aroused great indignation through the strike zone and big meetings of citizens were held in both cities. Speakers condemned some of the nonresident, paid agitators for the series of crimes, of which the murders were the latest. Both meetings adopted resolutions demanding that the sheriff use all means to rid the city of "murder inciting mercenaries."

Mrs. Pankhurst Again Released. London, Dec. 8.—Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst, the militant suffragette leader, who was arrested Thursday on her arrival from the United States, has been released from the Exeter jail. Mrs. Pankhurst was driven to a hotel. She appeared very weak as a result of the hunger strike she began immediately following her arrest.

COLONEL GAILLARD.

Laborer in Canal Construction Undermined Health.



COLONEL GAILLARD IS DEAD

Directed the Engineering Work in Culabra Cut.

Baltimore, Dec. 6.—Lieutenant Colonel David Du Bose Gaillard, U. S. A., who directed the engineering work in the Culabra cut division of the Panama canal, died at Johns Hopkins hospital here.

Colonel Gaillard had been a patient at the hospital since Aug. 17 last, suffering from a growth in the head, the result of seven years' arduous labor in the tropical climate of the canal zone.

He is survived by his widow and a son, Lieutenant David P. Gaillard, U. S. A. Both were at the bedside when the end came.

LINER IS BEACHED TO AVOID SINKING

Passengers and Crew of Vessel Said to Be Safe.

New York, Dec. 8.—The steamship Seminole of the Clyde line has been beached at Puerto Plata, San Domingo, to keep her from sinking after she sprang a leak.

This news reached the office of the Clyde line here in a message from their agents in Haiti.

The Seminole's cargo is being removed. It is understood that the crew and passengers are safe.

The Maritime Exchange posted a notice that the Seminole was a "total loss," but this was denied by the officers of the Clyde line.

Two messages were received, it was said, the first to the effect that the steamer had sprung a leak and was entering the port of Puerto Plata, the second that she had been beached and her cargo was being removed.

USE OF ARMORIES ASKED

Housing of Chicago's Unemployed Difficult Task.

Chicago, Dec. 8.—Armories of the Illinois national guard may be used for the housing of Chicago's army of unemployed, which is taxing severely the capacity of the municipal lodging house. A request for the use of the armories has been made to Governor Dunne and Adjutant General Frank S. Dickson.

"Something must be done immediately to relieve the crowded situation at the municipal lodging house," said Superintendent Charles F. Rogers. "The situation is worse than it has ever been before."

FORTY-SIX PERISH IN MARINE DISASTER

Stockholm, Dec. 6.—Forty-six lives were lost by the foundering of the Swedish steamer Malmberget off Bodø, Norway. The steamer left Narvik, Norway, Nov. 27 for Rotterdam. The Malmberget was of 3,903 tons.

TWENTY THOUSAND MEN OUT

Strike in South Wales Coal District Develops Rapidly.

London, Dec. 6.—Nearly 20,000 miners in South Wales are idle through the spread of the Great Western railway strike. The strike originated through the dismissal of an engine driver and although it was not authorized by the union the movement has developed rapidly.

COLD INCREASES FLOOD HORRORS

Hundreds of Texas Refugees Suffer Severely.

DEATH LIST IS ABOUT FIFTY

Thousands of Head of Cattle Have Perished and the Property Loss Aggregates Large Sum.

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+ Houston, Tex., Dec. 8.—Late + dispatches increased the number of known dead in Texas as floods to sixty-one, with the possibility that a heavy death toll by drowning reported at Sunnyside, but not confirmed, + would increase this number. +

Bryan, Tex., Dec. 8.—Cold weather caused intense suffering throughout the Brazos river bottoms, where hundreds of flood refugees—the majority negroes—have spent nearly forty-eight hours in trees.

The flood's death list still remains at about fifty.

More boats arrived in the bottoms from the gulf coast, strengthening the feet of hastily made frail craft.

The river began falling in this section, giving promise that before long most of the urgent rescue work will be completed as far south as Navasota.

Below there, however, is the crest, which exceeds all previous Brazos rises by two or three feet.

It has been impossible to get all the negroes to heed warnings and many of the white people refused to leave their property.

Thousands of head of cattle have perished in the flood. The greater part of this loss falls upon farmers with only small land holdings.

The losses in ginned cotton have been heavy. In lots of fifty to five hundred bales it has been swept away by floods at many points.

BANK MANAGER IS KILLED

Lone Bandit Then Makes His Escape in an Auto.

Plum Coulee, Man., Dec. 4.—After shooting H. M. Arnold, manager of the Bank of Montreal here, when the latter attempted to prevent him from robbing the bank of packages of money estimated to contain \$10,000, a masked bandit jumped into a high power automobile and at the point of his revolver forced the chauffeur to drive him to the North Dakota line. Officials of North Dakota, Minnesota and the mounted police of Canada searched the surrounding territory but found no trace of the robber.

ULSTERITES HIDING ARMS

Order Prohibiting Importation of Guns Causes Alarm.

Belfast, Dec. 8.—The greatest excitement has been created among the rank and file of the Ulster Unionists by the royal proclamation prohibiting the importation of arms and ammunition into Ireland.

During the night large quantities of rifles, bayonets and munitions of war were moved from Belfast to country towns in automobiles for fear the government authorities might put the Irish crimes act into force and seize the war stores already collected.

MORE IMMIGRANTS ARRIVE

Increase During October of 25,840 Over Month Last Year.

Washington, Dec. 8.—There were admitted to the United States 134,140 immigrant aliens in October this year, according to statistics just issued by the bureau of immigration of the department of labor.

This is an increase of 25,840 over the same month last year, when 108,300 were admitted. The number admitted, however, was nearly double that of October, 1911, when 69,418 immigrant aliens entered this country.

POST DECLINED BY DUPUY

French Ministerial Crisis Still Unsolved.

Paris, Dec. 8.—The French ministerial crisis brought about by the resignation of Premier Barthou after his defeat in the chamber of deputies on the question of the finance bill is still unsolved.

Jean Dupuy, after consulting his political friends, informed President Poincare that he must decline the task of forming a cabinet.

TRAIN WRECK IN ROUMANIA

One Hundred Persons Killed or Injured.

Bucharest, Dec. 8.—News reached this city that 100 persons had been killed or injured in a collision between a passenger and a freight train near Costesti, southwest of Bucharest, near the Danube.
