Residence of John Wartha



John Wartha, who purchased one of the houses on the lot where the new armory is to be built, put \$2,000 improvements on it. It is now located at 400 No. Jefferson St., and is an 8 room cottage. It is the building that was formerly known as

the Dance Pavillion. Contractors, Weilandt & Stegemann, mason, Reiser.

Another \$1200 was expended in improvements which were made by the Brown County Agricultural Society. This expense was made necessary by the burning of the cattle sheds just after the close of the Fair in 1912.

Fred Wellmann living on Center Street just west of Washington expended \$1200 in putting a new basement under his dwelling house and installing a heating plant. Puhlmann and Emmerich were the contractors employed.

Residence of Bernhard Klingler



The old school house, where so many generations of children have made their start at education, has been removed by Bernhard Klingler, to a location just south of the Fair Grounds on the east side of Broad-

way. He has fitted it up into a 10 room dwelling place and will paint it gray when complete. He is spending \$1,000 on the remodeling, and will have a very comfortable home when he has it finished. Contractor, Kaiser; mason work not yet done.

John A. Dietz who moved in from Cottonwood two weeks ago, bought a house from John Gronau on So. Franklin, between 3rd and 4th. Since the purchase he has put \$1,000 into raising the house and finishing it. There are now four rooms and bath down stairs and the same number with closets upstairs. The finish is yellow pine, grained. The floors are of hard wood. Mr. Gronau and Mr. Dietz did the work. Gulden & Hipert installed the plumbing.

Bastian, Marti & Brandl whose firm has been in business here for nearly a dozen years, five years under the present firm name, found they needed

more space for their ever-growing business and purchased the Hornburg Building directly across 2nd North Street from the Schell Building which they had occupied for a number of years. The change was made during the early part of the year and they moved in April. The Hornburg place had been occupied by the New Restaurant for several months prior to this and simply disappeared when the dry goods firm bought the place. A smaller restaurant was set up by Ed. Berndt in the old Toberer building and is still there.
