### LOCAL NOTES

Chairman Polkow and Commissioner J. P. Graff returned Friday evening from a trip to St. Paul which they had undertaken in behalf of the designated state roads of the County. At the last meeting the County Commissioners were informed by letter that their state road mileage would have to be reduced from 212 miles to 72 miles. The commissioners above named were designated as a committee to appear before the State Highway Commission and get them to rescind their recent order reducing the state roads to considerably less than half of the number of miles that had been designated by the County Board. Graff and Polkow succeeded in saving 128 miles of state roads for the County and consider themselves fortunate in accomplishing this much.


