Examinations for the teaching service in the Philippines will be held in all the principal cities of the United States, March 11-12. The bulletin sent out by the Government states that the service offers exceptional opportunities for young people who are qualified to take an important part in the development of a rapidly growing country. Graduates of Colleges, Normal, Polytechnic and Agricultural Schools are sought as applicants for the positions. Teachers who have had successful experience are also eligible. The positions offer salaries ranging from \$1500. up for men with expenses paid to the Islands. There is a maximum salary of \$2000 for teachers and \$3000. for Superintendents. This will be the last examination of the present year and appointments will be expected to sail for Manila within the next few months. 
