He tells us that he rather thinks of removing to Marshall from which city he removed to New Ulm. Mr. and Mrs. Arndt have shown themselves good citizens and the Review would be glad to see them remain here permanently. New Ulm is not a particularly good show town, however, and it is probable that the combining of the two houses will result in improved conditions which have not been the best ever since the establishment of the Gem. 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
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
