

**Articles of Incorporation of New Ulm Gas Co.**

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS, That we, the undersigned, do hereby associate ourselves together and agree upon the following articles of incorporation, under the provisions of Chapter 55 Revised Laws of the State of Minnesota, and acts amendatory thereof and supplementary thereto, and do hereby adopt the following articles:

ARTICLE I.  
The name of this corporation shall be "NEW ULM GAS COMPANY".

ARTICLE II.  
The general nature of its business shall be—  
(a) To establish, own, maintain and operate a plant or plants for the manufacture, distribution and furnishing of gas, and to furnish gas to towns, villages and cities, or any part thereof, and to the residents of such towns, villages or cities, and to any or all persons and corporations in the State of Minnesota, or elsewhere for the purposes of heat, light or power, or either of them.  
(b) To acquire and hold, bargain, convey and lease property of all kinds, and do all other acts and things necessary to the conduct and promotion of such business enterprises.

The place of the principal office or headquarters of this corporation shall be New Ulm, Brown County, Minnesota.

ARTICLE III.  
The Period of the duration of this corporation shall be Thirty (30) years.

ARTICLE IV.  
The names and places of residence of the persons forming this corporation are as follows:  
J. A. Kennedy, Virginia, Minnesota;  
J. P. Smith, Minneapolis, Minnesota;  
H. E. Oberg, Virginia, Minnesota.

ARTICLE V.  
The government of this corporation and the management of its affairs shall be vested in the following officers, to-wit: a Board of three Directors, who shall be stockholders of the corporation, and a President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer. The Board of Directors shall be elected by the stockholders of the corporation at their annual meeting; and the President, Vice-president, Secretary and Treasurer shall be chosen by the Directors at their first meeting after each annual meeting of the stockholders. The Directors and Officers shall hold their respective offices for a term of one year, and until their respective successors are elected and qualified. The annual meeting of the stockholders shall be held on the first Tuesday in August of each year, at such hour and place as shall be fixed by the By-laws of the corporation.

The names of the first Board of Directors of this corporation shall be as follows:—  
J. A. Kennedy, Virginia, Minnesota;  
J. P. Smith, Minneapolis, Minnesota;  
H. E. Oberg, Virginia, Minnesota.

Of whom, J. A. Kennedy shall be President; J. P. Smith, Vice-president; and Treasurer; and H. E. Oberg, Secretary.

ARTICLE VI.  
The amount of the capital stock of this corporation shall be Fifty Thousand (\$50,000.00) Dollars, divided into five hundred (500) shares of the par value of One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars each; the sum to be paid in as called for by the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE VII.  
The highest amount of indebtedness or liability to which this corporation shall be at any time subject, is the sum of Fifty Thousand (\$50,000.00) Dollars.

MUNICIPAL CHRISTMAS TREE ILLUMINATED.

**CITY CHRISTMAS TREE IS BASED ON LEGEND**  
Municipal Celebration Comes From Old Germany.

Many beautiful legends are connected with such a municipal Christmas tree as it is proposed to have in this city.

According to an old German tradition, St. Wilfred gets the credit of transforming the tree worship of the savage Teutons to a Christian ceremony. It was about the year 725 that he led a party of priests into central Germany for the conversion of the worshippers of the god Thor. Prince Gregor, the grandson of a king, was with him, having been entrusted to his care by the abbess of the cloister Phazel. On Christmas eve they were fighting their way through the snow of the forest when they came upon the heathen tribe at Geismar. They were assembled under the thunder oak, symbolic of the power of Thor, and were prepared to offer up sacrifice. The white haired priest of the heathens had chosen the young son of the chief as the fairest possession of the tribe, and he was to be offered, for the god was very angry and needed the utmost atonement.

As the venerable priest raised his stone hatchet on high and brought it down to kill the boy, who was ready and prepared for the stroke, Wilfred appeared and warded off the blow with his staff. The people were gratified at his saving their favorite and allowed him speech, and he gave them the creed of the Christians. Then he and Prince Gregor took their axes and cut down the thunder oak. As it was ready to fall the lightning came and split it in many parts, and it fell again.

The waiting tribe then benedict in its place a slender fir tree, green and sparkling and odorless. Wilfred bade the tribesmen to bear this tree to the hall of Grundbrad, the chieftain, to there assemble about it and make merry. About this first Christmas tree the wild men of the woods first heard the tale of the shepherd boy and the fields of Judah, and it gripped their sturdy hearts. The tribes became Christian and ever after used the fir tree as a token of the day of Christ's birth.

**OBITUARY**

**WILLIAM STIEHM**  
Word was received here last Friday that William Stiehm, at one time a resident of this city, had died rather suddenly at the State Hospital for the Insane at Hastings Thursday night. He had been suffering with stomach trouble for some time, but was not confined to his bed. Thursday after eating a hearty supper he retired as usual and was found dead in bed the next morning by the attendants.

The deceased who was about 40 years old was born in Henderson, in this state where he spent his childhood days and grew to manhood. Later he came to New Ulm where he became acquainted with Miss Lina Prokosch to whom he was married July 23, 1906. One daughter was born to them. Within a year after his marriage his mind became unbalanced and he was committed to the Hospital at St. Peter and was later transferred to the Hastings institution where he died. Mr. Stiehm is survived by his widow and daughter who reside on North Broadway. He is also survived by his mother, Mrs. Theresa Stiehm of Le Sueur and the following brothers and sisters: Henry and Ferdinand at Gibbon; Charles at Belle Plaine; Mrs. Carl Lindorf of this city; Mrs. Louise Leverenz, Henderson; Mrs. William Cass and Mrs. Lorenz Siemer, Le Sueur; Mrs. Wenzel Wiesner, Storm Lake, Iowa and Mrs. Nick Dormant, Sauk Center. The remains were brought to New Ulm and laid to rest in the Catholic cemetery Sunday with brief services at the late home at 1:30 in the afternoon.
