MARCH SETTLEMENT

That the taxes of this County are climbing higher every year is evidenced by the fact that the November and March March settlements are growing larger every year. This year's March settlement, which has just been completed by Co. Auditor Louis G. Vogel and Co. Treasurer Henry J. Berg is \$1,733.60 larger than it was a year ago. This year there was \$59,626.96 on hand to be distributed to the various funds as compared with \$57,893.36 the year before. To show how rapid the increase has been it is only necessary to state that the March settlement of the year 1906 amounted to only \$39,016.26 and in the year 1910 to \$43,307.68, in other words the taxes within the past ten years are one half again as large as they were ten years ago. As compared with the March settlement made last year, the State of Minnesota received this year \$2,289.50 more in the shape of taxes than it did the year before. The County taxes as far as this settlement are concerned are \$459.56 greater than last year and the villages and towns receive \$1,908.92 more than they did in the March settlement of 1914. The school districts, however, received less money. A total of \$1,923.99 less was distributed for school purposes on account of the March settlement this year than a year ago. Practically as much money was apportioned to the State of Minnesota, as was apportioned to the County fund. Towards the expense of conducting the affairs of the cities, villages and towns, of Brown County there was apportioned the sum of \$5,522.04 more than was apportioned to the County for the purpose of transacting the business of the County. Of the moneys apportioned to the cities, New Ulm received \$3,460.01, almost as much as was apportioned to Sleepy Eye and Springfield together. For school purposes there was apportioned to Independent District No. 1, comprising the city of New Ulm the sum of \$7254.52. This is one third in excess of all the moneys apportioned to all the school districts of the County, and \$1,030.46 larger than the moneys apportioned to the school districts of Sleepy Eye and Springfield together. Of the Rural schools over eight received more than \$100 under this apportionment, thirty eight of the rural schools received be-

tween fifty and one hundred dollars and 37 less than \$50. Two of the semi-graded schools received respectively \$783.67 and \$1,437.87. The March settlement as prepared by the County officials here and filed with the State Auditor reads as follows:
