MADELIA WINS GAME, 7-0.
The Madelia High School football team won over the New Ulm aggregation last Saturday afternoon at Madelia by the score of 7-0. It was a parody on the noble old game from start to finish, the two contending teams fighting it out on about the same principles as Homer's heroes battled before the walls of semi-mythical Troy. The game was called at 3:00 P. M. Madelia kicked off to New Ulm, Durbahn returning it to the center of the field before being downed. Then on the third play tried, Durbahn carried the ball over for a touchdown on a neat criss-cross formation. The ball was recalled, however, as the eagle eye of the Madelia referee had detected some slight irregularity in the proceedings which could be interpreted as a foul crime against law and order. From then on the game was the same old story. The New Ulm backs ripped off gain after gain, but could make little use of them since the penalties came so fast as to make the whole affair a farce. In the second quarter the Madelia fullback, after a line of smashes, was declared over for a touchdown. The game was marred by much unnecessary roughing, as the Madelia players made it a custom to pile up on the runner after he had been tackled. Time was taken out frequently for both sides. None of the players were injured, however, although several received minor bruises and scratches.

The forward pass was tried with varied success by both teams, Berg and Durbahn made several good gains via the air route and besides that these men managed to intercept several of the Madelia attempts. The Madelia backfield was both fast and heavy and it did good work in plays through the line.
