Each and every play produced has a strong plot with a sound moral to it. The comedy produced here, "Unsere Hussaren", ("Our Hussars") is a great drawing card. The audience will be kept in a continuous uproar of laughter from beginning to end. Gustav Olmar, as a Hungarian Corporal of the Hussars, will add a new leaf to his wreath of glory. He is well supported by a first-class ensemble. The plays are all rendered in High German, so that those also who cannot readily understand the various German dialects may have no trouble in following the play. Singing, dancing and music is all of a high class order. Mr. Olmar has just recently received new war songs from Germany that he intends producing. Besides these, medleys of folk and soldier songs will be rendered. The uniforms of the Hussars and uhlands come from the wardrobe of the German Theater and they are certainly worth seeing. Adv
