

OBITUARY

ARNOLD GULDEN.

At his residence at the county poor farm, Arnold Gulden passed away last Thursday morning after 6 o'clock as the result of a paralytic stroke which he had sustained during the night. He suffered an attack June 23d of last year and while he never fully recovered, it was not thought that the end would come so suddenly. Before the first stroke he was a strong, robust man, the picture of good health. The attack paralyzed one side of his body so that he had to walk with the aid of a cane or crutch.

Arnold Gulden was born August 26, 1859, in Cottonwood township, his parents being Mr. and Mrs. Nick Gulden, one of the first families to settle in Cottonwood township, and the deceased was one of the first white children born in this vicinity. He spent his younger days on the farm of his father and was married January 9, 1883, to Miss Mary Henle of this city. Shortly after their marriage the couple lived at Springfield, where Mr. Gulden was in business for himself. He later returned to New Ulm and worked in the Eagle Roller mill until he was appointed night police of the city, taking the place of Chas. Winkelmann, whose tragic death still remains one of the unsolved mysteries of this city. He served on the local force for several years but since April, 1910, he has been overseer at the county poor farm.

The deceased leaves a widow and five children to mourn his loss, also eight grandchildren, is aged parents and three sisters and a brother, Gerhard Gulden of Cottonwood, Mrs. John Schneider of New Ulm, Mrs. John Reinhardt of Cottonwood and Mrs. Frank Schmelz of St. Cloud. The children are Alois and Isidore Gulden and Mrs. Wm. Friedrichs of New Ulm, Nick of Cobden and Cecelia still living at home. The deceased was one of the charter members of the Catholic Order of Foresters in this city and also a member of the Second Regiment band, which organization turned out to play the funeral dirge.

The funeral services were held at the Catholic church at 9:30 o'clock Monday morning and were attended by the several organizations to which the deceased belonged in corpore. Interment was made at the Catholic cemetery.

ERNST FRICKE.

The death of Ernst Fricke occurred at the home of his daughter, Mrs. H. W. Engelbert, 14 South Washington street, shortly after 7 o'clock Monday morning as the result of a stroke of apoplexy which he had suffered a few hours before. He had been ailing for the past month, but his condition was not regarded serious at any time. Old age, however, made its demands and the stroke of apoplexy was too much for his already weakened condition.

Ernst Fricke was born June 20, 1830, at Platendorf, Hanover, Germany, where in the early '50's he was married to Sophia Wassmann, who preceded him in death a year ago last August. They came to America in 1864 and at first settled at St. Peter. A short time later they removed to a farm in Belgrade township, Nicollet county, where they resided until about nine years ago. They made their home in New Ulm for two years and then removed to Mapleton, where the death of Mrs. Fricke occurred. Since losing his life companion, Mr. Fricke has made his home with his daughter, Mrs. Hermann G. Borchert at Mapleton, until about two months ago, when he came to New Ulm to live with his daughter, Mrs. H. W. Engelbert. The deceased leaves six children, Ernst Fricke of Rockford, Wash., Henry Fricke of Mankato, Mrs. H. W. Engelbert of New Ulm, Mrs. H. G. Borchert of Mapleton and Charles Fricke of Mankato.

The body was shipped to Mapleton Tuesday afternoon and the funeral services will be held from the Mapleton Lutheran church this, Wednesday, afternoon.

ELDRED GIESEKE.

Hope that the injuries suffered by Eldred Gieseke through the accidental shooting at the Kuehnel farm a week ago Saturday, would not have a fatal termination vanished last Tuesday afternoon, when the wounded boy's condition suddenly became worse and resulted in his death at 7 o'clock that evening. Eldred was the twelve-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Wm. H. Gieseke, residing on North Broadway. He was an unusually bright young fellow, popular with his schoolmates and well thought of by his teachers and the sudden ending of his young life is a sad one, indeed. He was born in New Ulm January 19, 1904, and was attending the Lutheran school up to the time of the accident. Besides his grief-stricken parents, who only two years ago lost another son, twelve years of age, the deceased is survived by two brothers and two sisters, Clarence, who is attending school in Chicago, Stanley and Agnes at home and Mrs. Robert Marquardt of this city.

Funeral services were held at 2 o'clock at the Gieseke home and at 2:30 at the German Lutheran church and interment was made at the Lutheran cemetery. Rev. C. J. Albrecht officiated. Friday morning an inquest was held at the Gieseke home over the body of the deceased as it was a case of death through other than natural causes and came under the jurisdiction of the coroner. The inquest was for the purpose of satisfying

the officials and the general public that the shooting was entirely accidental and not the result of a quarrel. The evidence brought out the fact that the rifle the boys had been using that day was defective and that a nail was used in place of a firing pin. The weapon would often miss fire at the first attempt to discharge it, but to the knowledge of the boys who were called as witnesses had never gone off accidentally. All were agreed that the weapon went off accidentally in this case, however, although all of them were too excited at the time of the shooting to remember just how it all happened. Young Rufus Taylor, in whose hands the weapon was at the time of the shooting, stated that he was about six to ten feet from Eldred when the rifle went off. Besides the boys, the farm hand at the Kuehnel farm and several physicians were called upon to testify. The jury brought in the verdict that "Eldred Gieseke came to his death as the result of a bullet wound caused by the accidental discharge of a rifle in the hands of Rufus Taylor."

FRIEDA CORDES.

The death of Frieda Cordes, six-months old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Hermann Cordes occurred Friday morning, death following convulsions. The little baby had been ailing for about a week. Funeral services were held from the German Lutheran church Sunday afternoon and interment was made at the Lutheran cemetery.

MRS. JOHN JOHNSON.

Word was received in this city Wednesday morning of the death of Mrs. John Johnson at Minneapolis. She had been ill for several months and a few days previous to her death underwent an operation deemed necessary as a last resort.

Deceased was a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Garbrecht of this city and was born in New Ulm July 10, 1889, being the twin sister of Mrs. Otto Geisinger. She attended the public schools of this city and until her marriage April 12, 1910, to John Johnson, lived here with her parents. Following her marriage the young couple at first took up their residence at Sandstone, Minn., and later removed to St. Paul and Minneapolis. Besides her husband the deceased leaves three small children to mourn the loss of a loving mother. She also leaves her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Albert Garbrecht of New Ulm and the following brothers and sisters: Emil of Minneapolis and Martin of New Ulm; Mrs. Otto Geisinger, St. Paul; Mrs. Arthur Penkert, New Ulm; Martha and Gertrude still living at home.

The remains were shipped to New Ulm Thursday and taken to the Garbrecht home on North Franklin street. The funeral took place last Saturday, with short services at the house at 2 o'clock, followed by funeral services at the German Lutheran church, Rev. C. J. Albrecht officiating. Interment was made in the Lutheran cemetery.

ANTON ALTMANN.

The death of Anton Altmann occurred Tuesday afternoon of last week at his farm home in West Newton as the result of a stroke of apoplexy which he suffered about a week previous to his demise. He had a previous stroke some years ago his body being partly paralyzed ever since. He was able to do the lighter farm work, however, and his condition was never considered serious until recently.

The deceased was born August 19, 1879, on the West Newton farm where he died and where he had resided continuously all his life. He was married July 11, 1899, to Miss Helena Traurig of New Ulm, and the newly married couple at once took up their residence on the old homestead. Besides the grief-stricken widow the deceased leaves three daughters and one son all still of tender age. He also leaves his aged mother and the following brothers and sisters: Robert, Joseph and Frank Altmann and Mrs. Joseph Kienlen of West Newton; Mrs. Joseph Beyer, New Ulm; Mrs. Fred Retzlaff, Sleepy Eye. His father died about nine years ago.

Funeral services were held at the Catholic church at St. George, Friday morning at 9:30 and interment was made in the St. George cemetery.

RICHARD C. WEGNER.

The death of Richard C. Wegner occurred at his home in Oakes, S. D., Feb. 21, after an illness of about three months, from diabetes and resulting complications. The deceased was born in Nicollet county, Dec. 15, 1868. His parents, who were among the early pioneers of this vicinity, moved to Charleston, Redwood county in 1872. He was married in 1897 to Miss Mary Borchardt of Springfield. He was well known in New Ulm as a traveling representative of various farm machinery houses.

The remains were shipped to Lamber-ton, where the funeral took place last Tuesday morning.
