HIGH SCORES ROLLED IN ELIMINATION TOURNAMENT.

R. Dahms and Ed. Huhn Pile Up 1242 Score With Huhn And Groebner a Close Second.

Contrary to expectations the entries in the elimination tournament did not come up to the number that at first was thought would enter. Whether this was due to the high score put up by Ed. Huhn and Reilly Dahms the first few days of the tournament or due to lack of interest is not known. However those that did roll put up some very good scores.

The money which came in from the tournament will be divided among three bowlers, Ed. Huhn, R. Dahms and A. Groebner. Dahms and Huhn will divide first money between them, their 1242 score being the highest made. Huhn made a total of 606 with a 235 score and Dahms made a total of 636 with 232 score. Groebner and Huhn are the men for second place, being 35 pins behind the first men. In this game Ed. Huhn rolled master ball making 222, 201 and 204 consecutively for a total of 627. "Cy" Groebner rolled the highest single

score ever rolled in a match game in the last game of this match when he hit the pins for a total of 266. This gave him a total of 580 pins for the match. "Cy" Groebner again came in for prize money with Reilly Dahms and took third place with a total of 1160 pins. In this match the men rolled nearly equal, Groebner having a sixteen pin margin over Dahms. Some of these scores are the highest that were ever bowled in New Ulm tournaments or matches. Huhn's and Groebner's 470 for the last game of their match was the highest score in doubles rolled around these parts, while Groebner's 266 was the highest single score.
