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

and advantages have been effected by recent legislation.

Underwood Tariff Praised

We reaffirm our belief in the doctrine of a tariff for the purpose of providing sufficient revenue for the operation of the government, economically administered, and unreservedly indorse the Underwood tariff law as truly exemplifying that doctrine.

We recognize that tariff rates are necessarily subject to change to meet changing conditions in the world's production and trade. The events of the last two years have brought about many momentous changes.

In order to ascertain just what these changes may be, the Democratic Congress is providing for a non-partisan tariff commission to make impartial and thorough study of every economic fact that may throw light either upon our past or upon our future fiscal policy with regard to the imposition of taxes on imports or with regard to changed and changing conditions under which our trade is carried on.

Plank on Americanism

The part that the United States will play in the new day of international relationships which is now upon us will depend upon our preparation and our character. The Democratic party therefore, recognizes the ascendant and triumphant demonstration of the indivisibility and coherent strength of the nation as the supreme issue of this day in which the whole world faces the crisis of manifold change, it summons all men, of what ever origin or creed, who would count themselves Americans to join in making clear to all the world the unity and consequent power of America.

This is an issue of patriotism. To taint it with partisanship would be to defile it. In this day of test, America must show itself, not a nation of partisans, but a nation of patriots. There is gathered here in America the best of the blood, the industry and the genius of the whole world, the elements of a great race, and a magnificent society to be melted into a mighty and splendid nation.

We, therefore, condemn as subversive of this nation's unity and integrity, and as destructive of its welfare, the activities and designs of every group or organization, political or otherwise, that has for its object the advancement of the interest of a foreign power, whether such object is promoted by intimidating the government, a political party, or representatives of the people, or which is calculated and tends to divide our people into antagonistic groups and thus to destroy that complete agreement and solidarity of the people and that unity of sentiment and national purpose so essential to the perpetuity of the nation and its free institutions.

Conspiracies Are Charged.

We condemn all alliances and combinations of individuals in this country of whatever nationality or descent, who agree and conspire together for the purpose of embarrassing or weakening our government or of improperly influencing or coercing our public representatives in dealing or negotiating with any foreign power. We charge that such conspiracies among a limited number exist and have been instigated for the purpose of advancing the interest of foreign countries to the prejudice and detriment of our own country. We condemn any political party which in view of the activity of such conspiracies surrenders its integrity or modifies its policy.

For Preparedness

Thorough Preparedness on land and sea against unexpected invasion and the joining of the United States with other nations to "assist the world in securing settled peace and justice" were also urged in other planks adopted.

Plank on Mexico

The Monroe Doctrine is reasserted as a principle of Democratic faith. That doctrine guarantees the independent republics of the two Americas against aggression from another continent. It implies as well the most scrupulous regard upon our part for the sovereignty of each of them. The want of a stable, responsible government of Mexico, capable of repressing and punishing marauders and bandit bands, who have not only taken the lives and seized and destroyed the property of American citizens in that country, but have insolently invaded our soil, made war upon and murdered our people thereon, has rendered it necessary temporarily to occupy, by our armed forces, a portion of the territory of that friendly state.

Intervention as Last Resort.

Until, by the restoration of law and order therein a repetition of such incursions is improbable, the necessity for their remaining must continue. Intervention, implying as it does military subjugation, is revolting to the people of the United States, notwithstanding the provocation to that course has been great and should be resorted to it at all, only as a last resort. The stubborn resistance of the

President and his advisers to every demand and suggestion to enter upon it, is creditable alike to them and to the people in whose name he speaks.

Shipping Bill Indorsed

Immediate provision should be made for the development of the carrying trade of the United States.

Until the recent Democratic tariff legislation, it was hampered by unreasonable burdens of taxation.

On Agriculture.

We favor the vigorous prosecution of investigation and plans to render agriculture more profitable and country life more healthful, comfortable and attractive, and we believe that this should be a dominant aim of the nation as well as of the states.

For Woman Suffrage.

We recommend the extension of the franchise to the women of the country by the states upon the same terms as to men.

Protection of Citizens

We again declare the policy that the sacred rights of American citizenship must be preserved at home and abroad and that no treaty with any other government shall receive the sanction of our government which does not expressly recognize the absolute equality of all our citizens. Irrespective of race and creed or previous nationality and which does not recognize the right of expatriation.

At the earliest practical opportunity our country should strive earnestly for peace among the warring nations of Europe.

CAMBRIA GETS GOOSE EGG

Great disappointment was manifested by the fans who witnessed the game Sunday between Cambria and the Gophers, because of the one-sidedness of the game. The Cambria players evidently were not in the same class as the Gophers for at the end of the game the score stood 14 to 0.

But five of the visitors were able to reach first base, two of whom reached second base in safety but none were able to advance any further. Two scratch hits were secured off Schapekahn while the Gophers hit Wied liberally, getting several doubles and one triple.

Bunn, a new man, played in left field for the Gophers and although no chance was given him to show what he could do in the way of fielding he certainly showed that he was there with the stick, getting a triple with three men on bases and later a double with two on bases. Lindemann and Schapekahn each secured a double in addition to which Schapekahn hit a single. Burk, who has been hitting the ball steadily this year, also secured two hits yesterday while Forster, although he didn't get a hit, handled first base in classy style and caught fourteen visitors.

Arndt seems to be in bad with the pitchers for in every game he is sure to be hit and Sunday was no exception. The visitors' ability to handle flies saved them from a greater defeat but as it was it was a general clean-up.

In the second frame the Gophers scored five runs and but for a one man double play they might have piled up several more. Schapekahn got eight of the visiting players with his curves and four of the locals whiffed the ozone.

Next Sunday the Gophers will go to Winthrop and try to down the team of that city. As Winthrop generally has a strong team a big fight is looked for.
