WILL BE HELD AT STATE FARM
SCHOOL.—HUNDREDS EXPECT
TO ATTEND.

Attention is being given more and more each year to rural life and along with the many farm bureaus and farm schools come the Rural Life Conferences, the first of which in this state is to be held at the University Farm the 24th and 25th of this month. Superintendent Kennedy has received information from State Superintendent C. G. Schulz outlining the general scope of the work for this first gathering.

It is hoped by means of this conference to find out the attitude of people of the country side toward the work that the state departments are attempting to do and to learn their ideas in connection with the practicability and usefulness of various endeavors of county agents. There have been communities which have refused the services of the county agent after having had one for a period of time and it is necessary to learn what factors enter into the successful co-operation of the agent and the man or woman he is trying to help to better living.

It is planned to give most of the time in one section to the consideration of problems in connection with rural school consolidation which is one of the most important questions of the present day. CONSOLIDATED SCHOOL ELECTS TRUSTEES.

District Nos. 72, 49 and 80 of Brown County and Nos. 63 and 64 of Nicollet County recently consolidated and the pupils of these districts will hereafter attend school in Comfrey. Under the state law, the number of the district formed by joining the others will be the lowest one, that is No. 49.

The first election of school officers was held at Comfrey last Saturday evening, July 15th, and a board of six directors elected. The two who will serve one year are Oscar Kratz and C. G. Gabrielson, those for two years are A. W. Peterson and W. E. Hudson and those for three years, Oscar Thor and H. D. Reed. This is the first consolidation among rural schools in Brown County.

ETIQUETTE OF THE FLAG.

For the benefit of those who are interested in knowing when the colors should be displayed at full staff and when at half staff and what ceremonies should be observed to show the proper respect for the flag we print the following information:—

The colors should be displayed at full staff on

Lincoln's Birthday, February 12.

Washington's Birthday, February 22.

Battle of Lexington, April 19.

*Memorial Day, May 20.

Flag Day June 14.

Independence Day, July 4.

Columbus Day, October 12.

Battle of Bunker Hill, June 17.

Battle of Saratoga, October 17.

Surrender of Yorktown, October 19.

Evacuation Day, November 25.

*On Memorial Day, May 30th, the flag should fly at half staff from sunrise to noon and full staff from noon to sunset.

In Order to Show Proper Respect for the Flag the Following Ceremony Should be Observed:

It should not be hoisted before sunrise nor allowed to remain up after sunset.

At "Retreat" sunset, civilian spectators should stand at "attention" and uncover during the playing of the "Star Spangled Banner." Military spectators are required by regulation to stand at "attention" and give the military salute.

During the playing of the national hymn at "Retreat" the flag should be lowered but not then allowed to touch the ground.

When the National Colors are passed on parade or in review, the spectator should, if walking, halt, and if sitting arise and stand at "attention" and uncover.

When the National and State, or other flags fly together the National Flag should be placed on the right.

When the flag is flown at half staff as a sign of mourning, it should be hoisted to full staff at the conclusion of the funeral.

In placing the flag at half staff, it should be hoisted to the top of the staff and then lowered to position, and preliminary to lowering from half staff, it should be first raised to the top.

The National Salute is one gun for every state. The International Salute is, under the Law of Nations, 21 guns.

BIG MONTANA LAND DEALS.

C. E. Brown of the Brown Land Co. of Madelia arrived home last Sunday from Montana, where he had spent the past month. As an evidence of faith in that country he, in company with W. C. Miller and Henry N. Somsen of New Ulm, purchased sixteen sections of land in Rosebud county, eastern Montana. Before they left for home they had disposed of twelve sections of their purchase. The C. E. Brown Land & Loan Co. also bought nine sections, most of which has already been resold. Mr. Brown and A. J. McLean also purchased three sections in that county.

In the past several weeks these men have sold 32 sections of Montana land, part of which was that which they had purchased themselves and part was property that had been listed with them. Mr. Brown and the New Ulm men are now negotiating for the purchase of 14 sections more.

Among those who purchased Montana land from the Brown Company are former State Immigration Commissioner H. J. Maxfield, 7 sections, and Mr. W. F. Binswold, a former resident of Madelia, one section.

DON'T'S FOR DRIVERS.

Don't drive your automobile without being assured that it is equipped with adequate horn, brakes and lamps. You should have two white lights at the front and one red tail light.

Don't fail to stop the motor when leaving the car unattended, and don't fail to hitch your horse while standing unattended.

Don't cut out your "muffler" while driving in the city or passing a horse-drawn vehicle.

Don't fail to stop on signal from the driver of a horse-drawn vehicle, and stop the motor if necessary.

Don't fail to turn to your right of the center of the traveled road when meeting another vehicle.

Don't fail to give signal and turn to your left when passing another vehicle, but the driver of the vehicle you pass should permit you to keep to your right of the center of the traveled road, when possible.

Don't fail to remember that the center of the road means the center of the traveled road.

Don't fail to give signal when overtaking a pedestrian traveling in the road.

Don't fail to keep near the curb at your right when driving a horse drawn or other slow moving vehicle upon the business streets.

Don't fail to stop upon meeting or passing a frightened animal and stop the motor if necessary.

Don't fail to stop and give your name and number in case of accident.

Don't fail to give a signal at a crossroads where the view is obstructed.

Don't fail to keep to your right of the center of the intersection when turning to the right and pass to the right of such intersection when turning to the left.

Don't drive faster than 10 miles per hour on business streets.

Don't drive faster than 15 miles per hour on residence streets.

Don't drive faster than 6 miles per hour where view is obstructed.

Don't drive faster than 25 miles per hour at any time.

Don't drive faster than 4 miles per hour when passing a horse-drawn vehicle in charge of a woman, child or aged person.

Don't fail to employ just the least mite of common sense regardless of what the law may be.
