## INDIAN MONUMENT REMOVAL PLANNED

PARK BOARD NOW CONSIDERING  
PETITION OF STATE STREET  
RESIDENTS

CLAIMED THOROUGHFARE AT  
PRESENT LOCATION MUCH  
TOO NARROW

Plans to move the Indian monument from its present place at the intersection of Center and State streets, to a point midway between Washington and State streets, is being considered by the Board of Park Commissioners. The plan was brought up by residents of State street, and a committee appointed to take the matter up with the proper authorities. A meeting of the park board will be held some time this week, when a decision is expected to be reached.

### Street Too Narrow.

The chief objection to the present location of the monument is that the space which it occupies is too narrow, subjecting autoists and others driving vehicles, to danger of accident.

It is proposed to narrow State street its entire length some four feet, which if done, will make the crossing, with the monument in its present location almost impassable, advocates of its removal claim.

Center street, between the court house and the high school, is exceptionally wide, giving plenty of room for a wide thoroughfare on either side of the monument.

Removal of the monument was discussed two years ago, and the question was before the park board at that time, but dragged along for some time and was finally allowed to drop.

"The monument will be only a short distance above its present location, and will be in as slightly a place as now," said one of the park commissioners. "If State street is narrowed as is now proposed there will be all sorts of trouble and it seems to me about the only thing to do is to move it. Of course if there are any objections offered they will be carefully considered before any action is taken."

### Opposed to Moving.

While there are many people who believe that the monument should be moved, others are opposed to the plan.

"It made me sad when I read there was a plan under way to move the monument, said R. Pfefferle, an old resident of the city. "If they want the monument moved let them wait until the last defender is gone. When the monument was erected in 1890 we held a public meeting to decide on its location. It was the expressed wish of the defenders, after several places had been considered, that the shaft be placed at the intersection of Center and State streets and there it was erected. I say wait until the old fellows are gone and then let them put it wherever they want to."

S. of H. Pay Promptly.

That no delays are experienced in obtaining payment in cases where insurance is carried in the Sons of Herman Lodge, is shown by the prompt action taken in the case of the beneficiaries of the late Andrew Fielder of this city. The insurance money, amounting to \$1,000 was received last Friday, in just one week from the time that the necessary papers were sent to St. Paul according to C. "Well, I am very anxious to buy a few chickens, and I would like to look your flock over and see what you have," said the man. "I am willing to pay well for them."

"You are too late," said the woman.

"We sold all of ours last night and got a good price for them."

The man went away, apparently crestfallen.

It appears that a thief, the night before, had entered the hen house and carried away several of the choicest of the farmer's hens. In doing so he had dropped a pocketbook, containing \$80.

## WILL DRAIN TIMBER LAKE.

Commissioners of Nicollet county have decided to drain Timber lake, six miles west of St. Peter, and have called for bids to carry out the project. The expense has been estimated at about \$43,000.

It is claimed that several square miles of fine farming land will be reclaimed. Agitation for the draining of Swan lake, thus securing many thousands of acres of land, is also under way.
