

MANKATO TEAMS SHOW WONDERFUL FORM.

Last Friday evening two New Ulm bowling teams traveled to Mankato, where they tried their skill against two teams of that city. One of the two teams, of which "Coach" Seifert is captain, met the Van's Specials and although the New Ulm team put up some good scores the Mankato team threw scores that are hard to beat. The locals hit the pins for a total of 2651, making 863, 913 and 875 consecutively, while the Mankato team rolled a total of 2927 pins, with game totals of 957, 965 and 1005. This gave the Mankato team a majority of 276 pins.

Fritsche of the Mankato team carried off high honors for the evening by making a total of 666 pins. In the second game of the match he threw a 244 score and in the other two games he rolled 213 and 209. Ahnert of the same team was but one pin shy of a 200 average, his high single score being 225.
