 Rothier, Constantin Nicolay, Octave Dua and Desire Defrere. And besides there were attractions other than these off and on the stage to intensify the Carmen atmosphere. Signor Cleofonte Campanini, the gifted conductor of the orchestra, takes full credit for his interpretation of the Carmen music, which is indeed an integral part of the opera and serves to tell the story and portray the emotions as much as the acting and singing. The dances by Albertina Rasch and Corps de Ballet also claimed the attention of the Review scribe and musical critic, whose impressionistic enthusiasms found their emotional stimulus in the audience as well as on the stage. He was quite deliciously and properly shocked by the display of dazzling white shoulders of the semi-dressed elite of the Twin Cities; and his eyes wandered along with the ninety seven per cent of the house (the three per cent could not see) to one of the \$100. boxes where a Rumanian princess reposed in solitary state with the crown jewels of the Maharajah of Turkestan upon her frail shoulders.
 And Saturday night came the incomparable performance of that greatest of all operas, Il Trovatore; artificial, insincere, old-fashioned and as full of mistakes as the Democratic Administration the critics call it, but in spite of critics and mistakes it is an immortal work, for the public which cares little for mimetic reality in an opera knows and loves the wonderful melodies of Verdi's masterpiece. One has only to mention the superb duets, "Home to Our Mountains," the "Miserere and Prison Song," the Count's solo, "The Tempest of the Heart," and the Soldiers' and Anvil Choruses, and then one can realize why with such artists as Louise Homer, Morgan Kingston, Marie Rappold, Alma Peterson, Giovanni Polesse and Leon Rothier the performance created as great a sensation as it did.
 To describe this night's performance adequately would exhaust the dazed scribe's stock of superlatives, and yet no one who has not seen and heard Louise Homer in the part of the gypsy mother will realize that he has missed one of the rare moments of life. We all hope Mr. Ellis will bring his company to us again, and that he will not let the technical critics deprive us of the pleasure of hearing our favorite melodies in Il Trovatore once more, — common tunes, perhaps they are, technically unreal, but as Kipling says, "I can rip your very heart-strings out with those."
