A number of New Ulm people are getting ready to "adopt" some of the war orphans in France and Belgium. To "adopt" means to provide food and clothing for some war desolated child.



The Heider Tractor



A Big Job of Threshing.

Dear Sirs:—I am pleased at what the Heider Tractor is doing for me. I have been pulling a 28-inch threshing machine for three years now. The first year I threshed 40,000 bushels, the second 57,000 bushels, and this year 30,000 bushels. This was in all kinds of grain. I have threshed as high as 2,500 bushels a day. Then I do all my fall plowing with the tractor. I pull three 14-inch bottoms in all kinds of ground, sod and all. Then in the spring of year in stubble ground I pull five 14-inch bottoms.

I have plowed 500 acres of ground with this tractor, and for other field work I pull two 16-inch wheel disc harrows and I pull seven 5-ft. section harrow, and one year ago I graded roads six weeks. I graded nine miles of road with an 8-ft. grader and I pulled the grader without plowing first through sod and all.

Then I have been shelling corn this fall and winter with the tractor. I have a 4-hole Joliet sheller, with drag, but that is a plaything for the Heider.
