## UNWORTHY OF THE SACRIFICE

If George Washington or Abraham Lincoln were to take a ghostly walk down the aisles of time and happen to step into Mankato, the home of Long Distance Fighter Joe Reynolds, we wonder what sort of look would appear on their faces as they contemplated the sort of freedom their efforts had secured for their native land. It is a safe guess that they would certainly not recognize Mankato for a portion of the good old U. S. A. for which they gave their lives but would imagine that they had strayed from the road to America and had fallen in evil places, located perhaps in Darkest Africa or in the Russia they knew of old. One can imagine the look of sorrow that would settle upon the homely features of Old Abe as he saw the descendants of those who waged the awful Civil War for freedom tear the stars and stripes from the possession of others and throw them upon the ground and drag them in the dirt and trample upon them. It is not so easy to imagine what the stately Father of our Country would have felt but we are inclined to believe he would have looked about quickly for his hatchet to use upon the wild hoodlums who attacked the farmers there at Mankato in this civilized (?) day and age, or perhaps, with his slower judgment he might have seen that it was not really the hoodlums at fault but rather men like Joe Reynolds who sit in places removed from the scene of strife where their precious skulls are in no danger of getting cracked and egging on the irresponsible with words of violence and hatred. Shame on you Joe Reynolds, and all such as you! You are not worthy that the boys go across and fight for you and your kind.

When one stops a moment and thinks about some of the brutal attacks that were recently committed upon decent, law-abiding farmers who simply desired to show their preference for a gubernatorial candidate by arranging a booster tour thru their own county, we wonder that so much vindictiveness can be exhibited by citizens who under ordinary

circumstances would never have thought of resorting to brute force as an argument. But after all it is hardly to be wondered at when one remembers the kind of stuff that the daily newspapers have been dishing up to their readers for the past several months. It has been nothing but a campaign of vilification, a bid for mob violence that could but engender hatred and dissension. Altho the people of Comfrey, who took the law in their own hands, so to speak, are guilty, nevertheless in the final analysis the blame, and the entire blame, must and will rest with the newspaper men of this state who in their shortsightedness and in their desire to win out in a political campaign so stirred up a lot of people that they can hardly restrain themselves from committing open acts of violence against those who do not agree with them along certain lines.

## PAPER SUSPENDS

The Morton Enterprise which has been owned and operated by H. F. Rubey for the past five or six years was forced to suspend publication the past week, giving as their reasons for the suspension the lack of patronage by the merchants. Mr. Rubey has put out a good paper for a small place like Morton and it is to be regretted that he could not induce the merchants to agree with him as to what was right and fair in the way of patronage. However, it is barely possible that Mr. Rubey's excessive "loyalty" grated on the feelings of some of those he was constantly holding up to scorn and it may be too that the threat made by the Enterprise last winter to reveal the names of all who discontinued the paper was the cause of his losing the support of some who might otherwise have stayed with him. People do not like to be driven and threatened and when there is a chance to get even for that sort of treatment they are bound to take the opportunity. It is a lot easier to lead than it is to drive and apparently that is the lesson the Enterprise has had to learn. Morton merchants may also learn that a town without a newspaper is pretty apt to be a dead one and no doubt they will be anxious to have some one else start up. It seems that the Enterprise plant can not even be sold at a fair price this year because the merchants will not guarantee to support any man who comes in and takes the plant off Mr. Rubey's hands. This is short-sighted policy and the situation, is a deplorable one viewed from every angle.

## GERMAN WOMEN NOW MUST BE ENROLLED

CONSIDERED ALIEN ENEMIES. NOT ALLOWED TO CHANGE RESIDENCE

MUST HAVE FINGER PRINTS TAKEN AND FURNISH PHOTOGRAPHS

Registration of all German women aliens 14 years old and over began Monday in Minnesota and will continue for ten days. All German born women except those who have married American citizens will be required to register. If an American woman has married a German alien she also is required to register.

**Austrian Subjects Not Included**  
Female subjects of the Austro-Hungarian empire are not required to register as yet. Women who were born or have lived as German subjects in Alsace-Lorraine since 1871 and in Schleswig-Holstein since 1866 and now living in the United States are considered alien enemies and must register unless they have become citizens of America by marriage or naturalization.

**Internment For Disobedience**  
Failure to register within fifteen days after the registration closes makes alien women subject to internment for the period of the war.

A questionnaire must be filled out by each alien woman in writing and finger prints will be taken of both hands and three photographs of each registrant will be attached to the questionnaire.

**Must Stay Put**  
Following the registration no alien woman will be allowed to change her place of residence without a permit from the registration officer. In New Ulm the registration will take place at the police station. In cities of less than 5000 population the registration takes place at the post office.

At a meeting of the committee on arrangements for the dedication of the log cabin held at Turner Hall Park Saturday evening, Fred Hamann was elected Chairman and Wm. F. Meile Secretary. **Parade Planned**  
Carl P. Manderfeld and Wm. F. Meile were appointed as a committee on the parade. They were instructed to get into touch with the committee of the Commercial Club and to work hand in hand with them in the matter of arranging the different features of the parade. It was planned to have a meeting of the members of the Commercial Club at the club rooms last evening and take such action as would be necessary to insure a satisfactory display.

**Program And Refreshments**  
John H. Weddendorf, John Henle and Miss Alice Haerle were appointed as a committee on program. They have under consideration now different numbers that should appear on the program and will present a tentative program at the meeting tonight. Fred Hamann, Robert Albrecht, Fred Behnke, and Geo. Marti are to look after the refreshments and entertainment features in the park during the afternoon and evening. The ladies on the committee will, of course, have charge of the ice cream stands. In addition to selling the 5 cent ice cream cones it is planned to serve ice cream sundaes in the log cabin and some of the ladies are planning how to make the interior of the log cabin look very attractive. It will of course become necessary to give names to these various sundaes to be served during the afternoon and evening and if anyone has an especially appropriate name to suggest the committee would be very much pleased to hear of it.

Hofmeister's Band has been secured to furnish the music during the afternoon and for the concert in the evening. A picture has been taken of the log cabin and it is the intention to sell ribbons with a picture of the log cabin as a souvenir of this dedication to help defray the expenses. Everything so far looks very favorable for a splendid and successful celebration.

At the trial of some of those arrested in Martin County lately in connection with Non-partisan troubles the court stated that so far as the complaint was concerned there were a number of assertions of misconduct that had not been borne out by the testimony. However, one thing had been proved: that the young man refused to remove the Lindbergh banner from his car when ordered to do so by Marshal Roloff and for the offense, he would find him guilty; also that because of the youth and good reputation the boy had always borne, he should make the punishment much lighter than as though he were an older man. A \$25 fine and costs, or twenty days in jail was then pronounced.—Martin County Independent.
