

MAKERS OF SWEETS**

**MANUFACTURERS OF ICE CREAM
WILL NOT BE CURTAILED
AS YET**

Every effort must be made to save and
preserve the fruit crop which forms a
most important item of our food supply.
Berries and other fruits will soon be
abundant in this state, marking the com-
mencement of the summer canning up-
preserving season. The sugar outlook,
however, is such that regular and normal
supplies to care for the usual heavy
summer demand, as well as the canning
requirements, cannot be expected, owing
principally to the lack of sufficient
vessels and transportation facilities to
bring the raw product into this country.

Providing Canning Supply.
To help meet the situation it is now
ordered:
First: After May 15th, all dealers are
forbidden to sell sugar to any manu-
facturer excepting bakers and public
eating houses except on surrender of
certificate. Manufacturers must obtain
certificates from administrator who
will issue them on basis of sworn state-
ments showing last year's use of sugar.
Important essentials are ice cream,
canned fruit, vegetables, milk, meat,
medicines. Manufacturers of these
products may receive requirements.
Other manufacturers are entitled to
80 per cent of last year's use.

Second: If available, retailers may
purchase and carry in stock sufficient
sugar to cover their seasonal require-
ments for full 30 days.
Third: For canning purposes only
retailers may sell to consumers 25 lbs.
of sugar at one time. The consumer
must sign a certificate to get this sugar
and is not expected to get more until the
first 25 lbs. is used. Additional lots of
25 lbs. may be secured as needed by
signing each time a certificate. Retailer
must send certificate to his County
Food Administrator.

Fourth: For general household con-
sumption, retailers are required to ob-
serve the same careful and limited dis-
tribution of sugar. That is, to sell at
one time no more than 5 lbs. per customer
in town and no more than 10 lbs. per
customer in the country. No family
should use for general household pur-
poses (not including canning and pre-
serving) more than 3 lbs. per person per
month.

Fifth: Merchants are requested to
sell sugar to regular customers only.

Keep the cultivator polished with much
use from now till fall.
Beans may be used as a succession
crop for grass, spinach or onion sets.
Don't leave melons out of the garden.
Melons take work but the end justifies
the labor.
Cucumbers require warm, rich soil
and plenty of moisture. Keep them
growing rapidly from seed to harvest.
Thorough cultivation in the garden is
of much greater value than artificial
watering.

**GUARD CLOTHES FROM
THE PREDATORY MOTH**

The surest way to protect clothing
from damage by moths during storage is
to rid them of all moth, eggs, or larvae
by beating, brushing and airing, and then
to seal them up so that no more moths
will have access to them, says Miss Ethel
Phelps of the home economics division
of the University of Minnesota. Pack-
ages closed by means of strips of paper
pasted over the joints are safer than
packages tied with string. Large bags
of heavy or tarred paper can be pur-
chased which may be sealed tight. Bags
made of heavy cotton cloth and sewed
up on the machine will also be moth
proof. Such receptacles will provide
safe storage space for the summer if
there are no moths in the garments when
they are put away. Nothing will prevent
moths already present from developing
at the expense of the garment.
All wool or fur clothing not protected
in moth-proof bags should be aired in

the sunshine for several hours at least
once a month.

Camphor balls or naphthalene may re-
pell the insects but will not kill them,
and their usefulness as a repellent dis-
appears with the loss of strong odor.

Plant gladioli for fall flowers. Plant
plenty of them.

Head lettuce requires cool, moist con-
ditions for growth. Consequently it can
be grown best in early summer and late
fall.

Tomato plants tied to stakes and kept
trimmed will produce nicer-shaped and
larger tomatoes, though not quite so
many of them.

Do not leave flowers out of the garden
this year. Plant annuals and set out

perennials. The value of flowers is go-
ing to be better recognized as this war
continues. Food for the body comes
first, but we dare not stunt in any way
the soul.

Late celery may be transplanted from
seed box to cold frame. Two or three
transplantings before the plants go into
the field make stockier and better rooted
plants.

A heaping teaspoonful of paris green
or powdered arsenate of lead to one
quart of flour or air-slaked lime, sprinkled
on cabbage when it is moist, will get the
cabbage worm.

Don't let up on the garden work.
There is still much to do to get the
crop well started. An hour in the garden
now is worth several a week or two
later.
