

New Ulm Review

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As soon as it became known that New Ulm had cast a majority of its votes for James A. Peterson a howl went up from the press of the state, branding the citizens as disloyal and as having gone over to the Kaiser. Very little if anything is said about the votes of other counties. In this connection it might be mentioned that Douglas County, the home of Senator Knute Nelson, cast 1517 votes for James A. Peterson and 1517 votes for the senior Senator giving James A. Peterson a majority of 439 votes in Senator Nelson's own County and at that Burnquist carried the County. We have heard no one say that the citizens of Douglas County are disloyal. Why the people of New Ulm and Brown County should always be branded disloyal if the vote does not conform with the wishes and desires of certain elements is simply beyond the comprehension of any fair minded person.

If Not, Why Not?

If you were to drive with your wife and children to some city, say thirty miles distant, to do your buying, where do you suppose your wife and daughters would want you to take them immediately upon your arrival at your objective city? Supposing there were small children in your family whose needs are manifold, where would your wife wish to take them for immediate attention upon arrival? Suppose again that your shopping should take half a day and your family's needs were filled in a short time, where would you leave them to wait for you to finish your business? In the average, up-to-date city the "Rest Room" would answer all these questions but not in New Ulm. Our city is beautiful, clean, attractive in every way. The shops are well supplied with goods. The clerks are polite and obliging and the stores are fitted with toilet conveniences to a certain extent but there is no rest room for general use absolutely no place for birds of passage to set a foot or find a stopping place.

With our streets lined daily with cars from within a radius of thirty miles in every direction, are not the merchants losing an opportunity of cementing the friendship offered us by customers from distant cities? A rest room established now and well kept up would be one more valuable asset of the town. But NOW is the time.

Cold Comfort.

The St. Paul Daily News sums up the primary election results in an editorial that hits straight from the shoulder at the existing order of things. The Daily News has not been supporting Lindbergh but has been pointing out the contemptible tactics of those in power who have shouted "Treason" and "Disloyalty" whenever the League tried to hold a meeting. Its attitude has been entirely fair to the League while not supporting it and now that the primaries are over it declares with no hesitancy that the nomination of Burnquist "by a squeak" is little comfort to the present executive and those who are afraid the state is going to the demagogue bowwows. The Daily News comes out strong for Comstock who it says will make a REAL governor. It may be obliged to change the name of its standard bearer but it shoots home some barbed truths when it pays Burnquist its respects as follows:

"The hullabaloo is over. The tumult and the shouting dies. Scattered returns, still far from complete, indicate that Mr. Burnquist has proved Minnesota's loyalty to his own satisfaction at least — by a narrow squeak. Politicians and editorial writers who have frothed at the mouth over the bare thought of what the wild wires might be carrying to the uttermost parts of the earth this sunshiny Tuesday morning, have earned a day off to recover from their brain storms. It must be a great comfort to them to see Minnesota's loyalty demonstrated by a few thousand votes. If we were really to accept this false standard of judging Minnesota's loyalty, the net result would be cold comfort for the genuine patriot. Something like 60 per cent loyalty for Minnesota isn't anything to wave flags about. But such a standard such a test of loyalty, is as utterly false as yesterday's primary result would be disheartening if we considered it as a straw vote on patriotism."

"The plain fact is that the great mass of the Lindbergh vote was as legal as the Burnquist vote, but that it voted an emphatic PROTEST against real wrongs as well as fancied grievances. Most of all, it voiced this PROTEST against the arbitrary, undemocratic and unlawful manner in which public affairs have been administered in this state during the past 12 months. It is well that Mr. Lindbergh was defeated. His defeat, however, is cold comfort for Mr. Burnquist."

"It is well that Mr. Lindbergh was repudiated. It is well, also, that Mr. Burnquist achieves his nomination by a vote that is, in fact, a repudiation. This, if anything, will drive the PROTEST in quarters where it must be heard. This, if anything, will open the eyes of the socially blind to the lesson that democracy cannot be trampled upon with impunity in Minnesota while that same democracy, in the hands of Woodrow Wilson, is at work leaving the whole world. On a bigger scale, it is the same lesson taught by the recent city election in St. Paul."

"Now we can proceed to the real business with which Minnesota, politically speaking, is chiefly concerned — the election of a REAL governor, of a man who measures up somewhere near the size of the job and its responsibilities. "This man is Judge Comstock."

Our War For Democracy.

There are some who yell their heads off about Humanity and Democracy who lack all the qualities that make for Humanity and Democracy and they are in reality nothing but little Kaisers and Czars themselves who would not hesitate to drive a man to suicide and bring his family to the verge of starvation just to show that their brand of Humanity is the proper one.

One of New Ulm's Kaisers and Czars no doubt is P. Liesch who has at different times shown that he has all the attributes of a tyrant and a slave driver. Nothing politically nor anything else can be done without his benign consent and if that has not been secured beforehand then he shows an autocratic spirit by denouncing those who have had the temerity to do something without consulting his highness. Mr. Liesch has been doing nothing else than hound Prof. Ackermann for the past year it would appear that he will not be satisfied until he has forced Prof. Ackermann and his family out of the city. How humanitarian such a procedure would be. Altho we have known Prof. A. Ackermann for quite a number of years, we have had no opportunity until he helped us out in an editorial capacity on our newspapers, to get in closer touch with the man, when we found him a highly cultured, well-managed man who is so vastly superior to his traducers that they appear to us as barking little curs. We are glad indeed that the State Bank has felt a need of his services altho we shall greatly miss his assistance in our work and we also regret the loss of the pleasant daily association with a real gentleman.

As long as one person's liberty is not safe in this country, we have no Democracy and when a limited number of men undertake to prescribe for everyone what he shall think and what he shall do, there is going to be something happen that will make life in Minnesota something to be compared with the days after the war in the South.
