Beneath the space provided for the "Date of Registration" shall be stamped or written the designation of the local board so deputizing the person applying for the card, and below the designation shall be written the word "SICK." When made out, the card will be mailed by the sick person, or delivered by his agent to the local board having jurisdiction of the area in which the sick person permanently resides.

Absentees
All men required to register under the new man-power law who expect to be absent on Registration Day from the jurisdiction of their local draft board should bear these facts in mind: The obligation rests on you, and you alone, to see that your registration card, properly made out, is in the hands of your local board on or before Registration Day.
