Articles of Incorporation of New Ulm Drainage & Construction Company

We, the undersigned, for the purpose of forming a corporation under the laws of the State of Minnesota, do hereby subscribe and acknowledge the following certificate of incorporation.

Article I.
The name of this corporation shall be the "New Ulm Drainage & Construction Company".

Article II.
The general nature of the business of this corporation shall be to build and construct ditches, drains and drainage works, bridges, roads and pavements, and to do other building and construction work; to take contracts from counties, municipalities, corporations and private persons for such construction and building; to let and sub-let contracts for any such construction and building; to buy, sell and furnish any or all material for such building and construction; to buy, lease, own, operate, sell and dispose of all machinery and equipment used in its said business; to buy, lease, own, sell, and dispose of any and all real and personal property that may be convenient or necessary for use in carrying on its business, and to do any and all other business convenient, incident to or necessary for the purpose above stated.

Article III.
The principal office and place of business of said corporation shall be at the City of New Ulm, Brown County, Minnesota, but offices and agencies may be established at such other places in this state, or in other states, as the Board of Directors may select, and the corporation may carry on building and construction at any place within or without this state.

Article IV.
The time of the commencement of this corporation shall be March 1st, 1919, and the period of its duration shall be thirty years.

Article V.
The names and places of residence of the incorporators are as follows, to-wit: Fred Aufderheide, Residence, New Ulm, Minnesota.
Karl H. Aufderheide, Residence, New Ulm, Minnesota.
Herman J. Aufderheide, Residence, New Ulm, Minnesota.
P. B. Jenniges, Residence, Wanda, Minnesota.
Otto Montgomery, Residence, New Ulm, Minnesota.

Article VI.
The government of this corporation and the management of its business and affairs shall be vested in a board of five directors, to be elected by the stockholders at each annual meeting and to hold office for one year and until their successors are elected and qualified.

The annual meeting of the corporation shall be held at its office or place of business in the City of New Ulm, Brown County, Minnesota, on the second Tuesday in March each year.

The names and addresses of those comprising the board of directors until the first annual meeting are as follows, to-wit: Fred Aufderheide, Karl H. Aufderheide, Herman J. Aufderheide, all of New Ulm, Brown County, Minnesota; P. B. Jenniges, of Wanda, Redwood County, Minnesota; and Otto Montgomery, of New Ulm, Brown County, Minnesota.

Article VII.
The amount of capital stock of the corporation shall be one hundred thousand (\$100,000.00) Dollars, to be divided into one thousand shares (1000) shares of the par value of one hundred (\$100.00) Dollars each, which shall be paid in money or property, or part money and part property at such times and in such amounts as the Board of Directors shall order.

Article VIII.
The highest amount of indebtedness or liability to which the corporation shall at any time be subject shall be One hundred thousand (\$100,000.00) Dollars.

Article IX.
Each stockholder shall be entitled to one vote for each share of stock owned by him.

Article X.
The board of Directors shall meet immediately after their election each year and shall then elect from their number a president and vice-president, and shall elect from their number or from the stockholders, a secretary and treasurer. The office of secretary and treasurer may be held by one and the same person. All such officers to hold office for one year and until their successors are elected and qualified. The Board of Directors shall have power to select, employ and discharge such other officers and employees as they may deem necessary from time to time.

"HEY THERE," DO YOU WANT A HOME ON A FARM?

This is the unique title of a little booklet which the Secretary of the Interior is sending to the various camps of the army, navy, and marine corps throughout the country to ascertain the attitude of the men toward his plan for providing them with work and homes on reclaimed land.

The booklet is in the form of questions and answers which give a complete and concise description of the plan, and also has attached to it a post card questionnaire which the men are asked to fill out and mail to the Department. Each man interested will be asked to state his name, home address, age, occupation before enlistment, whether he has ever worked on a farm, whether he is interested in the plan, what kind of farming he would like to follow, whether general, live stock, truck, or fruit, and whether he would be willing to take a job in his own State or anywhere in the United States if a job on one of these proposed projects is offered to him.

A tabulation of the replies will be presented to Congress in connection with Secretary Lane's request for an initial appropriation of \$100,000,000 to begin construction on meritorious projects throughout the United States.

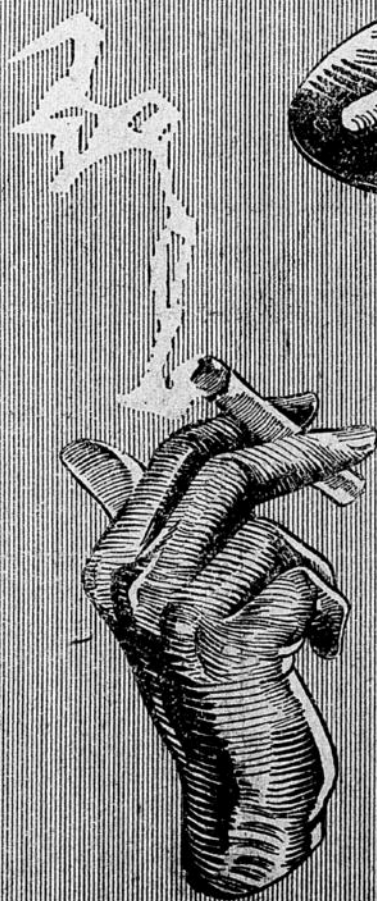
