#### RESTRICT ONS IN SHIPMENTS

German Government Notifies U. S. That Food Articles and Clothing Will Not Be Accepted.

Postmaster Fred. Pfander was notified by the postal authorities at Washington that they are in receipt of a communication from the German government stating that certain kinds of food articles and clothing will not be accepted after this in parcel post packages. The articles enumerated are: Butter, meats, bacon, flour, sugar, pineapples, ginger, vanilla, caviar. It probably may be assumed that the restriction put on clothing is only meant for new articles.

The children's clinic which was held here last Saturday in the Rest Room of the new Municipal Building was a full success in every respect. No less than fifty-three children were examined by Dr. Otto Groebner of Minneapolis, a New Ulm boy, with the assistance of Miss Christianson, a health nurse, and Miss Emma Potter, New Ulm school nurse. The attending ladies as well as the mothers of the children examined were full of praise of the thorough and beneficial work done by the doctor and the two nurses. No doubt, many a mother received some valuable hints in regard to the proper feeding and rearing of her little ones.

The clinic was under the auspices of the Minnesota Public Health Association, the Brown County branch of this organization paying the expense. The arrangements were made by members of the Mother's Club of New Ulm, who deserve special credit for the kind and efficient way in which they assisted the mothers in getting their children ready for the examination. Miss Potter who did all the clerical work in a most efficient way was of valuable assistance to Dr. Groebner. It was a strenuous day for all workers connected with the clinic, the examinations lasting from 10 a. m. to 6:30 p. m.
