

NEW RATE MATTER**

ST. PAUL COMMISSIONERS
ASKED FOR FURTHER
INFORMATION.

ONLY FEW PEOPLE ATTEND
PUBLIC HEARING AT
CLUB ROOMS.

Only about twenty people attended the public hearing relative to the raise in telephone rates as proposed by the New Ulm Rural Telephone Company. Many of those present were directors of the telephone company and there seemed to be no little opposition on the part of the public to the proposed increase. Apparently, the two members of the Minnesota Railroad and Warehouse commission, J. W. Howatt and M. V. Solberg, who conducted the hearing were of the opinion that some of the proposed increases were too high to get the commission's approval, while others are considered very reasonable leaving room for a still further increase.

Want Further Information.

The commissioners in the main inquired about reports having been sent to them in regard to the local situation. They asked for further information on the subject and stated that it would take about four or five weeks to get this preliminary work straightened out. At any rate, it will be January 1, before another step will be taken in the matter. After that date, there either will be another hearing here in New Ulm or the officers of the local company will be asked to appear before the committee in the Capitol city.
